Mayor Campbell Signs Girl Scout Proclamation

Mayor Charlie H. Campbell Monday signed a proclamation designating October 31 through November 6, 1971, as Girl Scout "Person-to-Person" Week.

Person-to-Person Week is a nationwide program to bring more girl members and adult volunteers into Girl Scouting and to involve the community more fully in Scouting activities.

In Brevard, the week will be marked by "Say Hello Day" and other local activities. VA estimates that 265,000 guaranteed and insured loans (including 25,000 mobile homes) will be closed during fiscal year 1972.

The Mayor, in his proclamation, saluted Girl Scouts of the United States of America and called upon all citizens to join with them in their effort to make "a positive contribution to peace through the common bond of friendship and understanding among peoples."

He noted that, through their service projects in hospitals, day camps, child care centers and homes for the aged and their efforts to save the environment and to help eliminate prejudice, Girl Scouts have added strength to the total fabric of community life.
