1964 the second Sky City Discount was opened in Hickory, and since that time 15 additional units have been opened bringing the total to 17 Discount type operations in addition to several conventional type stores.

Other locations are in High Point, Waynesville and Charlotte, Spartanburg, Greenwood, Greenville, Mauldin and Anderson, S. C. Morristown, Greenville and Maryville, Tennessee, two stores in Augusta, Georgia and one in Oxford (Anniston) Alabama. Additional units are under construction in Lancaster; S. C. and Athens, Ga. for an early spring opening. Conventional type stores are also operated by Sky City in North Carolina, Tennessee and Kentucky.

Fixtures for Sky City stores are especially designed and built to fit the structure and to make self-service shopping convenient and easy for every age. Aisles are extra wide for shopping cart traffic and daylight lighting is evident throughout the store. There will be multiple checkout registers where customers can be quickly served after finishing their shopping.

Store hours will be from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday afternoons for the convenience of families who wish to shop together and have varying working hours.

All local and bank credit cards will be honored by Sky City and they will have a "no extra charge" lay-away plan.

Sky City stock was accepted for trading on the American Stock Exchange in 1969. M. C. Peterson, of Asheville, is President and General Manager, B. A. Bower, of Knox-

ville, Tenn., is Chairman of the Board and V. L. Johnson, of Asheville, is Executive Vice-President.

The new store will feature, in its various departments, National Brand Name Merchandise as well as private brands at prices discounted from usual retail prices. Very few "Fair Trade" or price maintained items are stocked by Sky City.

The new Sky City store will employ approximately 60 people, practically 100% to be selected from the Brevard area.
