Last Saturday with 18 inches of snow on the ground the 1971 Deer Hunt season came to an end.

Reports are that this has been a most successful deer hunt season. This is the first season that Forest wide management has been in effect. This new program enabled hunters to go anywhere in the National Forest without checking in at certain areas each day.

From the discussions we've had with several hunters they like this system but if anyone would like to comment about the new system we'd be glad to hear from you.

To help make the new system work both Forest Service personnel and State Game Protectors patrolled the Forest the first week.

Thru the help of concerned hunters in the Ivestor Gap area we were able to track down and apprehend a hunter who shot a young doe.

Last Friday several hunters went to the woods early expecting the snowfall to be light—some of their vehicles are still there.

Forest Service officials worked into the night Friday retrieving stranded hunters returning them to warmer, safer areas. We do not pull vehicles out of the snow—our only purpose was to save people.

At least the danger of forest fires has diminished for awhile.
