

Q. My 17 year old daughter has been disabled since birth. She and I are collecting monthly Social Security benefits on my deceased husband's earnings record. Is there any way my daughter's monthly benefits can continue after she reaches 18 even though she will not be attending school?

A. If her condition is se-A. If her condition is se-vere and she remains in your care, you and your disabled daughter's Social Security benefits may continue after her 18th birthday. Call or visit, your Social Security of-fice about 6 months before your daughter's 18th birth-day to apply for childhood disability benefits.

Q. Since my father died, I've gotten monthly Social Security survivors benefits. I will turn 18 next year and will be graduating from high school. Can I continue to receive my checks if I go to college after graduation?

A. Yes. You may continue to receive survivors benefits until 22 as long as you are a full-time student and unmar-ried. You should receive a no-

tice sometime before your 18th birthday telling you to get in touch with the Social Security office if you plan to continue in school.

Q. Even though I am 66 years old, I am still working full time. My friends told me that I should find out about my Social Security retirement bene-fits. Should I do this when I'm still working?

32. ____ A. Yes, for several reasons. Even though you are still working you might be eligible for some Social Security checks. It all depends on your earnings. And, you could be missing out on valuable protection under the Medicare program.

Q. I am not eligible for a monthly Social Security check, but I did sign up for Medicare. I am being billed every 3 months for my medical insurance premiums. Since I receive a Veterans Administration pen-

Pay Taxes Now And Save Two Per Cent, Says **Tax Collector**

Transylvanians are urged to pay their property and personal taxes now.

According to Tax Collector Vernon P. Fullbright, a penalty of two per cent goes into effect on January 1st.

Mr. Fullbright states:

The 1971 N. C. General Assembly has re-written and modernized the property tax law of this state known as the Machinery Act. The revision went into effect on July 1, 1971.

This means that your current real and personal property taxes are due and payable NOW. and that you will be assessed a 2% penalty if you wait until after the first of the year to pay.
