Tribute Is Paid To Old Brevard Methodist Church Which Burned

(Editor's note: The following letter was written to the members of the First United Methodist church by the pastor, Rev. Orion Hutchinson. It is a tribute to the old church building which recently burned. Since it is of much interest to many readers of The Times, we are reprinting

Dear Friends,

Today I wish to pay tribute to a place where I've never been. I invite you to pause in appreciative recollection of a sanctuary precious in memory.

Two weeks ago the old edifice which from 1904 to 1958 housed the Brevard Methodist church burned to the ground. Because so much of our con-gregational life is immersed in our present structure and many of us came to Brevard after our present facilities were put to use and thus did not know the old, it would be easy for this old building to pass away unnoticed and unmentioned save in a news clipping. Yet I cannot let this

Precious to the hallowed memory of many of you are moments and events which took place when in that old building. There you felt the first tugs of religious inspiration and gained the earliest insights of religious information. There you caught the vision of life in commitment to Christ and registered it by union with the Church at her chancel. There you and yours went for the blessing of God upon the adventure of matrimony. There you brought your own to make them His own through the waters of baptism. There you brought also your own who had passed beyond mortal sight to pause in affectionate tribute and to find comfort through the vision of immortality. There you worshipped and worked and heard the melodies of Zion and the messages of the Word. There influences invaded your life to make its immeasurable yet indelible contribution.

Of course, it is true that the Church is not a building -she is people. And the

Church thus may be housed in any sort of building and move from place to place. Yet this does not mean that a building cannot have meaning and be treasured in memory. To say that we now have a place of increased beauty and added usefulness, worthy to succeed as a home for the Church, a tired and limited facility should not thereby blind us to the beauties of the
