And the fact that Transvlvania's largest industry is now unionized is a story that certainly rates as one of the top ten of 1971.

Census Gain

A January headline cited Transylvania population officially at 19,713, a gain of 20.4

We consider this important in the building - growing theme in Transylvania. It shows, we believe, that more people are finding this area desirable as a place to live and work. This is important, for obviously there can be no real progress if there are not enough people to make it.

Governor's Visit

Our July headlines introduced stories of North Carolina move of a Battalion Head-Governor Bob Scott's visit to Whitewater Falls, Connestee and Sapphire Valley. This was something more than the usual efficial visit-it was a V.I.P. recognition of the progress being made in this county.

Specific interest in the visit lies in a statement made by Governor Scott to the effect that the state now has matching funds to complete the new, scenic Whitewater Falls Road-something that has been needed for some time. Similar interest lies in the statement by Mr. Mal-

colm Meyer, President and Chairman of the Board of Certain-teed Products Corporation, parent organization of Realtee, to the effect that the governor's enlightened ad-ministration had been a factor in bringing Realtec's multi-million dollar investment here. Politics aside, it is important that state administration be respected if busi-
