

Blue Devil Wrestlers Hand Tuscola First Defeat Ever

Brevard High's wrestlers handed previously undefeated Tuscola its first loss last Friday night at Tuscola by a score of 36-19.

The loss was also the first ever for Tuscola to an area team since high school wrestling started in WNC six years ago.

Both teams were 7-0 on the season going into the match, with the Blue Devil grapplers advancing their record to 8-0, while Tuscola now drops to 7-1.

Brevard was trailing in the match going into the final four contests, but Ronnie Banther, Mitch Burr and Tom Shipman all pinned their opposition while Benny Brown won his match on a decision to give the Blue Devils the important victory.

Mitch Burr had the fastest pin of the night over Mike Burris at 1:16, but Big Tom Shipman wasn't far behind as he dropped Davis in only 1:30.

Brevard Cagers Split With Tuscola, Girls Win No. Six

Tuscola's Mountaineers took advantage of ice cold shooting by Brevard to down the Blue Devils 60-50 in a Parkway Division basketball game here last Friday night.

The Tuscola Jayvees also won their contest over the young Blue Devils by a 67-55 margin, but Brevard's red hot girls helped stave off the loss of a triple-header by whipping Tuscola's lassies by a 55-43 score.

The Tall Mounties effectively clogged up the middle when it became apparent that none of the Blue Devils were hitting from outside, and this virtually shut off Brevard's usually potent attack.

Costly turnovers and miscues also greatly aided Tuscola's cause, and even when the Mounties got into foul trouble, the Blue Devils couldn't convert their numerous free throw opportunities that could have kept them in the game had they been falling.

Big Jesse Scruggs used his height advantage to contribute 22 points to Tuscola's winning effort but three other Mounties were also in double figures, with Lee, Bedford and Riley scoring 16, 12, and 11 points respectively.

The Mountaineers' win lifted their record to 6-4 while Brevard is also 6-4. Denny Griffin

was the Blue Devils' only scorer in double figures with a game-high 29 points.

In the girls game, Cathy Daniels scored 14 points and Joyce Patterson fanned in 13 to pace Brevard's sixth win in 10 games. Kem Shoaf scored 21 for Tuscola now 6-4.

Norman Witek To Direct '73 AAU Regional Track Meet At Lenoir

Lenoir has the honor of being the city awarded to hold the 1973 United States A.A.U. Men's Regional Track and Field Championships, involving a six-state area.

The states of North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama and Tennessee will participate.

The President of the United States will light the torch in Washington, D. C. and athletes from various colleges will run the torch to Lenoir.

The Commissioner of Amateur Athletic Union appointed Norman L. Witek, Assistant Professor of Health and Physical Education at Brevard College, as meet director.

Witek's helpers will be Mike Shea, from North Carolina State University at Raleigh, North Carolina, as referee; and Harold Confield, from the University of Tennessee.

There will also be a modified Olympic Pageantry which will be staged with the help of Walt Disney Productions and the director of the Ed Sullivan Show.

Every governor, senator and congressman from all six states have been invited.

The 82nd Airborne Division Band and the Pope Air Force Band has been invited to open and close the ceremonies.

Roy J. Silva, the commissioner, said the meet will truly be one of the finest ever run in the United States.
