Brevard Police Department Busy During Last Six Months

Brevard Police Department records for the last six months (June through December, 1971) show a slight increase in two out of four categories of major traffic arrests and five out of nine categories in arrests other than traffic. The other categories in both areas showed a slight decrease in the number of arrests.

Minor traffic arrests remained small for a city the size of Brevard and Police Department operating statistics showed the police remaining busy as usual.

This information is in accordance with a report prepared by J. C. Rowe Chief of Police.

In the major traffic arrests, there were 39 persons apprehended for Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol, compared with 37 in the preceding six months. Arrested for Speeding were 8; the preceding six months showed 9. Apprehended for Improper Movement—Accident, were 22; in the preceding six months there were 21. For Reckless Driving there were 7 arrests compared to 8 the preceding six months, and for Driving With License Revoked, 7 were arrested compared to 8 the preceding six months.

In the tabulation of Arrests — Other Than Traffic, Public Drunkenness showed an increase with 82 in the past six months compared to 76 the previous six. Assaults on a Female arrests also increased with 8 this period, and none the preceding six months.

Other arrests, the last six-month figure, and the previous six months number follow:

- Non-support, 2; previously 1
- Assault (simple), 8 previously 5
- Breaking and Entering, 10; previously, 5
- Disorderly Conduct (flighting), 4 and 5
- Trespassing, 8 and 2
- Larceny, 8 and 15
- Assault With a Deadly Weapon, 3 and 5
- Worthless Checks, 5 and 14
- Juvenile Pickups (Court Ordered), 1 and none.

Simple totals of minor traffic arrests for the last six months, without the previous six-month figures follow:

- Failure to Yield Right of Way, 1; Following Too Close, 1; Stop Signs or Signals, 6; Exceeding Safe Speed (5 miles over speed limit), 3; Improper Registration, 1.

No operator's license, 4; Improper Muffler, 7; Driving Left of Center, 3; Racing, 2; Driving Too Fast For Road Condition, 1; and No Liability Insurance, 1.

The Police Department operating statistics for the last six months show a total patrol car mileage of 58,000 and 1,965 Calls Responded To.

Another figure in Chief Rowe's report shows 120 man-hours of formal training in which two additional Breatherizer technicians were qualified, while informal on-the-job training for new officers continued throughout the period.

SOCIAL SECURITY

Questions And Answers

Q. I take care of a woman's children in her home Monday to Friday for \$25 a week. She doesn't pay any Social Security on my wages or deduct anything from my weekly checks. I'm not yet ready to retire, but I want to be sure I get the right credit for work. Is there anything I can do?

A. Call the Asheville Social Security office, 252-8773 as soon as possible. We will look into your case and see that you get the correct Social Security credit for your work.

Q. I was taken ill while I was on vacation in another state. After I got home, I sent my bills to Medicare like I always do, but they returned them to me and told me to make the claim where I was sick. Why can't I file my Medicare claim here?

A. Generally, your Medicare claim must be filed with the Medicare office in the state where you received the Medicare services. In this way, Medicare can keep track of costs of particular medical services within an area. YOUR MEDICARE HANDBOOK gives a complete list

of places where Medicare claims are to be submitted.

Q. I recently got a job as a waitress. Even though my wages are not much, my tips usually averages \$45 a week. My employer says I must tell him how much I get in tips so he can report them for Social Security. Is this so?

A. Yes, because your tips are more than \$20 a month. The law requires you to give your employer a report in writing by the 10th of each month on the tips you received the previous month. Your employer then reports these tips and sends your Social Security contributions to IRS. Your tips for this month must be reported by January 10th.

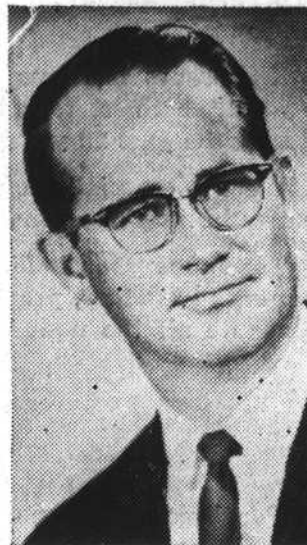
If your tips were less than \$20 a month, you would not have to report them.

Rev. Clay Frazier Is New Pastor At Calvary Baptist

Rev. Frazier was born in Blaine, Tennessee and was educated in the public schools of Granger County, Tenn. He received his B. A. degree from Carson - Newman in 1952 and his B. D. degree from Southwestern Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas in 1955.

Rev. Frazier married Pearl Price in 1951, and they have three children: Charles, age 11; Richard, age 8; and Rachel, age 7.

Coming to Brevard from North Park Baptist Church of Allison Park (Pittsburg), Pennsylvania, Rev. Frazier has served in pastorates in Tennessee, Oklahoma, Texas, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Almost eleven years of his service has been in the pioneer mission field.

Rev. Frazier was elected to serve two terms as President of the State Convention of Baptists in Ohio. He also represented the state of Ohio as a member of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Rev. Frazier will begin his service as the pastor at Calvary on February 14, 1972.

He succeeds Rev. Nolan W. Ford, who resigned several months ago to accept a pastorate in Alabama.
