Track Team Downed At VMI

At V.M.I. the members of the track team were disappointed in the outcome of the meet. Lynn Harrison failed to make the opening height mainly due to his lack of control on his new pole. Lynn broke his 15 foot pole and replaced it with a 16 foot one and it will probably take him two or three weeks to get used to the difference.

Clay White scratched on all three jumps in the triple jumps, and Sam Beasley's 21' 2" did not qualify him for the finals. The sprint Medley Team, composed of Goodspeed, Harrison, Beasley, and Triplett, failed to place in the top five teams.

Of those who went to Knoxville, the only placer was Bob Young, who finished fifth in the 60 yard high hurdles with a time of 7.9. When asked for a reason why the team gave such a poor performance, Coach Wittek had this explanation to offer:

"Brevard's poor performance was due mainly to lack of experience as most of the team consists of freshmen. The flu epidemic may have also hampered some of the performances of the men."

Brevard's next meet will be February 11th and 12th in Knoxville, Tennessee. Today the team is qualifying for Saturday, which marks the finals.

STATEMENT OF WARRANTY
Subject to the provisions and conditions stated below, in the event of mechanical failure of the Vehicle, the Selling Dealer agrees as follows:

(1) For a period of 30 days, beginning _____ or 2,000 miles after delivery (whichever occurs first), the Selling Dealer agrees to repair or replace the engine, transmission, rear axle, brake system, or electrical system—without charge—to the extent necessary to keep the Vehicle in serviceable condition under normal use.

PROVISIONS
(a) Mechanical failures resulting from collision, accident, abuse or lack of maintenance, are expressly excluded from the above coverage.
(b) Repairs are to be made in the Selling Dealer's Service facilities.
