### Brevard And Rosman Lose Games In Opening Rounds Of Tourney

Tuscola captured two victories in the opening round of the Haywood-Transylvania Invitational Basketball Tournament last Wednesday, the boys tripping Brevard, 66-52, and the girls winning by a 35-27 count over Rosman.

Brevard jumped out to a 12-9 first quarter lead in the boys game on the hot shooting of Mike Morris and Denny Griffin, who were high for the Blue Devils with 23 and 14. Brevard took a 27-22 advantage to the dressing room.

The third period belonged to Jody Lee of the Mountaineers. Lee poured in 14 of his 18 points to send the Tuscola squad past Brevard, 44-39, at the end of the third quarter. The Mountaineers outscored Brevard, 2-13, in the final period to hold on for the win.

Lee was high scorer for the Mountaineers. Jessie Scruggs and Bert Medford added 15 and 12.

In the girls contest, Lynn Shoaf canned 16 for the Tuscola quint. Susan Pangle led

Rosman with eight. Opening round play will continue Thursday with Rosman and Brevard squaring off in the Jayvee game; Brevard goes against Pisgah in the girls game; and Pisgah faces Rosman in the boys game to round out the action.

### Brevard College Freshman Is Outstanding Vaulteer

Lynn Harrison, Brevard College freshman, may be one of the U. S. finest up coming vaulters. From a private school in Blue Ridge, Virginia his vault of 15' 1 1/4" ranked him as the 17th best vaulter in high school. He won all his major meets including the Florida Relays and the Atlanta Classic. However, a lack of competition and exposure may have cost him an invitation to the Golden West.

Though many high school vaulters ranked ahead of Harrison, he was sought after heavily because of his fine technique. Many college coaches ranked him as one of the best.

His technique has already brought him a personal best of 15' 6" in an indoor meet in Knoxville, Tennessee. This performance is one foot higher than any vaulter in North Carolina thus far. His goal is set at 16' 0" indoors, with a goal of 16' 6" outdoors. Harrison's biggest problem is changing over from his 15' pole to his 16' pole. He made the change last week and is expected to have trouble for another two or three weeks.

It is only a matter of time before he masters his technique and reaches his goal of becoming one of the U. S. finest vaulters.
