Wind damage was heavy in the Davidson River area last weekend. Over 250 trees were blown down in and adjacent to the new Davidson River Campground. Unfortunately most of these trees are those that were left especial-ly for the aesthetics of the area.

The damaged trees will be harvested and used for lumber and woodpulp so at least it won't be wasted. The volume of timber in the blow down is about 25,000 board feet.

They want to thank A&P for taking their bottles, and helping them to get more money are as follows: in their treasury.






