## Scuba Diving Course Offered By The Recreation Department

The Blue Devils lost some of their grip on first place last Saturday when they traveled to Tuscola and dropped their first conference game of the season to the Mounties by a 10-2 margin.

In that one, Tuscola's Taylor Latham pitched his Mountie mates to victory, keeping the Blue Devils pretty much in check most of the way. Tuscola scored four big runs in the third inning, added another four in the fourth and two more

in the sixth to account for their ten runs.

The Blue Devils scored singletons in the fourth and sixth innings, but that wasn't nearly enough. Chris Sneed took the loss for Brevard.

Tuesday against North Buncombe, Brevard was down to the Hawks 5-2 going into the bottom of the seventh, and it looked like the visiting Birds were enroute to a big win over the Blue Devils.

But it wasn't to be, as Greg Nelson walked, Ricky Salter hit into a fielder's choice, Randy Frisbee singled and moved to second on a passed ball, and then Chris Sneed singled in two runs and went to second on the throw, narrowing the mar-

gin to 5-4.

Kevin Coan then singled Sneed across the plate with the tying run, and Stan Hudson was walked, bringing Bob Arnett to the plate.

Arnett then singled to drive Coan home with the winning run, and the Blue Devils had wrapped up their eighth win in ten outings, with Randy Frisbee getting credit for the victory on the mound.

Brevard's conference mark now stands at 4-1, and they will try to improve on that when they play a big double-header here Friday afternoon against the East Henderson Eagles.
