U. S. Air Force Captain Wayne H. Glazener, son of Mr. and Mrs. James B. Glazener, Rt. 1, Brevard, has been recognized for his participation in Operation Linebacker II, the successful air campaign last December against key military targets in North Vietnam.

Members of USAF's Eighth and Seventh Air Forces and U. S. Navy Task Force 77 who carried out the operation have received and coveted Collier Trophy for 1972. During the campaign, Captain Glazener served as a B-52 Stratofortress navigator with the Eighth which is headquartered at Andersen AFB. Guam. He is assigned permanently to the 96th Bomb

Wing at Dyess AFB, Tex. The 27 aerospace leaders and authorities serving on the Collier Selection Committee of the National Aeronautic Association unanimously selected Operation Linebacker as the greatest achievement in aeronautics or astronautics of the year. The committee cited the campaign as a crucial and decisive factor leading to the return of U.S. prisoners of war


