Professionalism Hallmark Of Brevard Music Center

Most area music lovers know the Brevard Music Center is a mecca for the performing arts with renowned guest soloists stunning opera productions, concerts and mu-

The hallmark of Brevard Music Center has become professionalism but such a hallmark is not easily attained. Long years of study and practice are required and behind every stunning performance there are innumerable hours of study and practice.

First and foremost, the Center is an educational institution and the fruits of that education are seen in the alumni of the Center long years after they have concluded summers of study at the Center. There is, however, a more immediate recognition of study and education. Stage center during weeknight and days at the Center is the youth who has come to the Center to learn from master musicians. The youth dresses for a concert, calms his butterflies, tunes his instrument, and appears in concert with the

Transylvania Youth Orchestra, Transylvania Wind Ensemble, or in student recitals seen every Wednesday afternoon at the Center.

In concert he is under the masterful batons of such talented conductors as Robert Barr, Ward Woodbury or Mario Mancinelli. These professionals spend long hours readying for one concert to last a mere two hours. Program planning, auditions, rehearsals, and individual attention consume much of their time but still makes them available to the student for instruction, advice, counsel, and fellowship.

In a few days or a few weeks the youth orchestra is molded into a workable, professional sounding symphony that can delight audiences. The experience and exposure afforded students with weekday and weeknight concerts provides an important stepping stone for their individual careers. They quickly reach the point where the Center places them at a crossroads. They must choose between music as a pastime and music as a career. Even at this

point conductors and instruc-tors are available for advice. In the overall picture of the overall picture of the Center, this point is often missed by crowds who attend major concerts at the Center. for they are unaware that five or ten years from now they may see or hear one of these students as a featured soloist at a major concert.

To say students at the Center are amateurs would be neglecting an important fact. They may be students at Brevard Music Center, but at the same time they are young professionals. These young talents are the stars of the future in the music field.

Brevard Music Center students appear in concert frequently during the season offering music lovers an excellent opportunity to see stars of the future at a considerable savings on ticket prices with no sacrifice in quality.


