Murder Cases To Highlight Docket For First Session

The trial of three men in connection with the slaying of Mr. and Mrs. Bill D. Hice at Balsam Grove on September 12th will highlight the October Criminal term of Superior court next week.

Charged with murder are Gary McCall, Lawrence McCall and Lloyd McCall, who have been held in the local jail without the benefit of bond. All three men face two counts of murder.

While the Criminal docket opens on Monday, the murder trials will not begin until Wednesday, according to the present schedule of trial of cases, Mrs. Marian McMahon, Clerk of Superior court, announces.

The double slaying is reported to have followed a dispute over property access.

Other Cases

Frank E. Penson is charged with non-support, and his case is slated for trial on Monday.

William V. Howell faces a charge of driving with license revoked.

Leroy McCall will be tried on a breaking and entering charge.

Granville B. Liles faces a selling marijuana charge.

Bennie N. Moore will be tried for kidnapping.

Public drunkenness is the charge against Walter G. Hooper, Jr., who also faces a driving under the influence charge.

Marvin A. Brown will be tried on a first degree burglary charge. —Turn to Page Five

Four Arrested

Youthful Larceny Ring Broken By City, County Investigators

A total of 34 city and county cases of breaking and entering and larceny are considered cleared by the arrest of four Transylvania County youths who allegedly made up a larceny ring that has been active in the county for the last several months.

The joint city-county investigation began June 1st, resulted in the arrests on August 25th, and concluded October 5th.

Arrested on charges of breaking and entering and larceny, were Joe Cliborne Reynolds, 16, and Stephen Lee Whitmire, also 16, of Brevard. Also arrested were two juveniles who were charged with larceny. All four youngsters are now free on bond.

Many of the large number of items reported stolen in 23 city larceny cases, and nine county larceny and two breaking and entering cases, have been recovered and will be returned to the owners after the trials. Some items reported stolen, however, are still missing.

Among the cases considered cleared up by the arrests were:

—Breaking and entering at the Walter Miller and the Mrs. Marshall Gillespie residences on Williamson Creek Road.

—Larceny of tools at the Pisgah Forest School.

—Larceny of tools at the Olin parking lot.

Much Action Taken

Commissioners Considering Building Juvenile Shelter

The Transylvania County Commissioners heard a proposal at their Monday night meeting for the county to construct a juvenile shelter to house children who have no place to go because of family problems or court action.

The proposal was made by Donald Morrison, the county's new Social Services Director, on behalf of his department and a committee which has been investigating a local juvenile shelter for the county for several months.

Mr. Morrison stated that the Social Services Department currently has 15 children who would be eligible to be placed in this facility and that if they were there, the county would receive \$100 per month per child, which should cover the expenses involved in the home's operation.

Three North Carolina counties now have such shelters and Mr. Morrison plans to study these, find out their strengths and weaknesses, and also devise an ideal layout for this county.

Transylvania County received a grant in the amount of \$66,000 last spring, most of which will be used toward the construction of this facility. —Turn to Page Six
