Olin-County Program Of **Pollution Abatement Out**

Government officials here were keenly disappointed in the State Supreme Court rul-ing last week which ruled unstitutional a North Carolina law which would have helped industries to finance their pollution abatement

Olin Corporation's plans for the \$7,000,000 water and air projects underway at Pisgah Forest are unchanged. However, Olin will turn to other methods of financing the projects announced last April, rather than through bonds that were expected to be issued through efforts of the Transvlvania Conty Pollution Abatement and Industrial Facilities Financing Authority.

Garza Baldwin, Jr., President of Olin's Fine Paper and Film Group, said that the Supreme Court action will change the method of financing but not the charter of the

"We are disappointed, of course, not to have the ad- sylvania Times after learning lower interest charges than othvantage of a lower interest rate that might have occurred with preme Court: tax-free bonds, but we nevertheless are committed to the projects. They will be continued to conclusion."

William M. Ives, Chairman of Transylvania Board of Commissioners, and Ray N. Simmons, Chairman of the Transylvania Authority, both expresed disappointment that the enabling legislation was not acceptable to the State Supreme Court. They said they are hopeful that the next General Assembly will correct whatever error was found in the earlier bill.

"Any new legislation would be put to a court test also, which would probably make it too late to help with Olin's local projects," Mr. Ives said.

"The concept is good, however, and it would be of benefit to other projects whether at Olin or elsewhere in the county. I favor leaving the local Authority as it stands until the legislation is clari-

Mr. Simmons made the folof the ruling by the State Su- er methods of financing.

"I regret the Court's action very much. The bond program was a very worthwhile concept that would have benefited all the people.

"It would have expedited the correction of pollution problems, not just by Olin but by others as well. If we cannot have the plan as drawn in 1971, we need acceptable alternative.

"The fact that such support is allowed in most other states serves to strengthen my position that North Carolina needs a workable plan by which local governments can help their tax-paying industries accomplish their environmental objectives."

> Olin's projects were the first to be considered by the Transylvania Authority, which was the first local authority to be appointed in this part of the state after passage of the enabling legislation in 1971. The Transylvania Authority has worked closely with the North Carolina Department of Conservation and Development in preparation for the joint program.

The Authority had approved the Olin program and the Authority's action had been ratified by the Board of Commissioners. The Authority was prepared to seek final approval of the North Carolina Department of Conservation and Development and the Local Government Commission, and to issue Mr. Simmons also said that the bonds once the court suit was settled favorably.
