County Baptist Charges Against Brevard ABC Store Are Answered

The chairman of the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board said Tuesday he has been assured that irregularities uncovered in the operation of the liquor store in Brevard in connection with raids on private clubs in that area last month will be corrected.

Dr. L. C. Holshouser said the br. L. C. Hoishouser said the state board discussed the matter at its meeting Monday with John I. Anderson, chairman of the Brevard ABC Board; and Robert Hill, the store super-

In passing the resolution, the Association urges all citizens concerned with the number one Warner Maupin, chief of en-forcement of the ABC system, had found a role of tax stamps drug problem, alcoholism, to vote AGAINST the Liquor-Byfor table wine from the Brevard store's cash register in an enve-lope at Sapphire Valley Inn.

Cook said that subsequent investigation showed the stamps were for 54 consecutive purchases of unfortified wines, which ABC stores are no longer authorized to sell.

The Brevard store supervisor said that the sale was made by

The sale of unfortified wines from ABC stores was authorized in mid-1972, but the state board order had long since been rescinded, Cook said.

The local chairman pointed out that the Brevard store had been authorized to sell unfortithe State Board, then Democratic, following the local wine and beer election in 1971.

The new Roard, which is Republican had not informed the local Board that it could not sell these unfortified wines.

"But we have now taken this wine, 12 per cent alcohol, from the local shelves," the Brevard chairman stated.

Cook said Fred Johnson, District 6 ABC enforcement super-visor, had also checked the Brevard store's file of transporta-tion permits for purchases of liquor up to five gallons by one customer "and found some of them to be in improper order."


