Interment was by Jerry and E. M. Arthur Gillespie, and Billy Bates and Howard Lance.

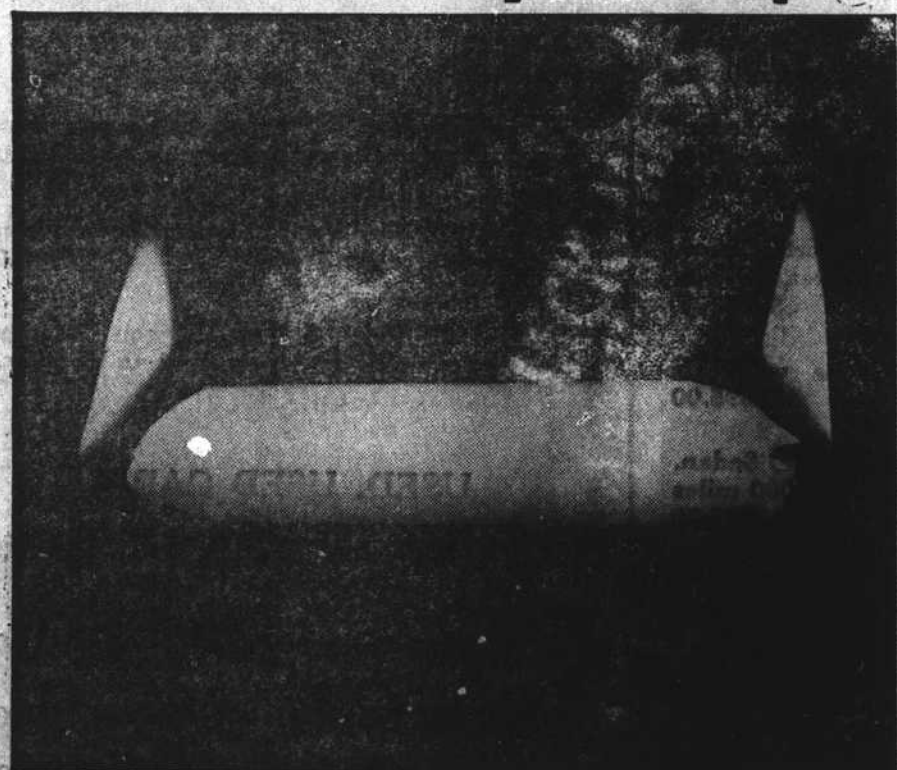

US Forest Service, Fire Danger Is High

Pisgah District Ranger Dan Hile today reports on some of the District's projects and emphasized that fire danger is still high.

He continued, stating that tree planting has been completed with over 300 acres planted, site preparation for natural regeneration of hardwoods is continuing, and erosion control work has started on timber access roads to be seeded and closed to vehicular traffic.

With the unusually warm weather, many recreationists are visiting the National Forest, especially on weekends. Cootree and Sunburst Campgrounds are open to camping

as well as US 276 to picnicking. The remainder of the recreation areas will not be open until May 24th.

Ranger Hile request that in using the National Forest for recreation in areas where a trash container is not available, please put trash in a bag and carry it out. Plans are now being made to have dumpsters available in the Recreation Areas and on U.S. 276 this summer for recreation users. This should make it easier for all to help keep a cleaner National Forest.

Again, a reminder to watch those burning trash piles, which can lead to a damaging forest fire.
