

Land use planning and control is generally understood use planning programs as a means of directing future land to mean a system of rules and gulations prescribing uses which a particular piece, zone, of land can be put.

Although a review of these imprehensive planning efforts akes for dull reading and af-r wading through facts and gures the reader is left with Accordingly, any system of regulatory rules from soning laws to the grand design of a new town are nothing more than land use plans. The assumption is that, in the ab-sence of planning and controls, land would be used in a ner deterimental to pub-health, safety, and welfare, or in a ma

sistent with preferences of a majority of the local population. In this sense, land use planning is a reaction to and an attempt to improve, undersirable use of land, resources.

The undesirable use of land enerally results from a market pricing that permits an inmplete accounting of land Rotary club.

use costs. Specifically it re-sults from a 'market pricing mechanism that, permits private costs of land use activities to remain below social costs of that same activity. Land plan-

ning attempts to account for ignored public costs of land delopment and, thereby, avoids desirable effects.

Theoretically, the market ystem is based on a self-regu-ating mechanism that does not equire land use planning. The —Tura to Page Three


