Much Action Taken

Commissioners Have Stormy Session At Rosman Monday

A crowd of just over 100 people attended the Board of County Commissioners' meeting Monday night in the Rosman High School auditorium.

The meeting focused on the placing of an ambulance in the Rosman area to be used in answering calls in the upper end of the County. It appeared that about three fourths of the audience wanted to see the ambulance given to the Rosman Rescue Squad and operated as a free service.

All three Commissioners expressed their feeling that this was neither practical nor fair. After a lengthy discussion from which no agreement could be reached, Commission Chairman Bill Ives appointed County Attorney Bill White, County Manager Mike Enlow and Commissioner Clinton Owen as a committee of three to meet with representatives of the Rosman Rescue Squad to see if some system could not be devised whereby a charge would be levied for the users of an ambulance and yet have it operate in cooperation with the Rescue Squad.

This committee will report its findings to the Commissioners at their May 28th meeting. The new ambulance arrived in Brevard Tuesday morning and it will remain at the Brevard location.

Breakdown Given

Transylvania Kindergartens To Receive \$116,370 In Year

Of the over \$98 million appropriated by the 1974 General Assembly to increase the state-subsidized kindergarten program next year, Transylvania Schools will receive \$116,370. State School Superintendent Cyril Phillips announced recently. Each school unit's allocation was figured on its 1973-74 first grade enrollment, based on the highest average daily membership for three out of the first four months of the school year, said Phillips.

The allocation will enable Transylvania Schools to operate six kindergarten classes during the 1974-75 school year,

which will serve 138 children. The State will have a total of 1,382 classes in operation next year, serving 32,016 five-year-olds.

In approving the allocations, the State Board of Education earmarked \$243,500 for inservice training for kindergarten personnel and \$90,400 for evaluation and assessment of the program. This money is not included in each school unit's net per pupil allocation; however, Transylvania Schools will receive \$1,050 for inservice training and \$250 for evaluation and assessment of the unit's overall kindergarten program.

Brevard Rescue Squad Will Hold Auction This Weekend

Because of an overstuffed warehouse, the Brevard Rescue Squad will hold a big Spring auction sale this weekend.

The sales will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings, beginning at 7:00.

The sale will be held at the squad building on Fisher road, and the public is cordially invited to attend.

To reach the squad building, you turn at the Lutheran church on Broad Street and cross the railroad tracks. The building is located on the left.

Event Continues For Four Days, Public Invited

Thirty-five years of progress at Pisgah Forest is theme of an anniversary celebration this week as Olin Corporation holds Open House over a four-day period.

Plants of the Ecusta Paper and Film divisions are holding Open House through Saturday, May 18th, in observance of the 35th anniversary of Olin's industrial complex at Pisgah Forest. The schedule is 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. daily plus an evening program Thursday from 5:00 until 8:00 p.m.

The two plants and the research facilities will be open to visits by employees, their families and guests, and the public in general.

A large tent is the welcome center, featuring numerous exhibits and a refreshment area. Tour information will be explained in the welcome center and guests will be given a program before boarding buses that will transport them to points where the plant tours begin. Visitors may participate in whatever tours they choose: the paper mill, the cellophane plant, and the research building; one, two or all three. Persons hesitant about walking may wish to stay aboard the buses for the ride around the periphery of the plants, and return to the welcome center for refreshments.

The minimum age for visiting the plants was dropped to six years for the Open House. It normally is 15 years. All children must be accompanied by adults. A nursery will be available for children too young to tour the plants.

The Open House is in celebration of the 35th year since startup of the former Ecusta Paper Corporation in 1939. It was destined to become the world's largest single plant for the manufacture of cigarette paper.

The Ecusta plant grew from an industry employing 400 persons in 1939 with an annual payroll of slightly over \$1,000,000, to an industrial complex employing more than 2,500 persons and an annual payroll in excess of \$25,000,000.

Feusta's four paper machines had grown to nine cigarette paper machines before Feusta was acquired by Olin Industries in 1949. In the years to follow, expansion saw installation of three of the world's largest Four-drummer paper machines for
