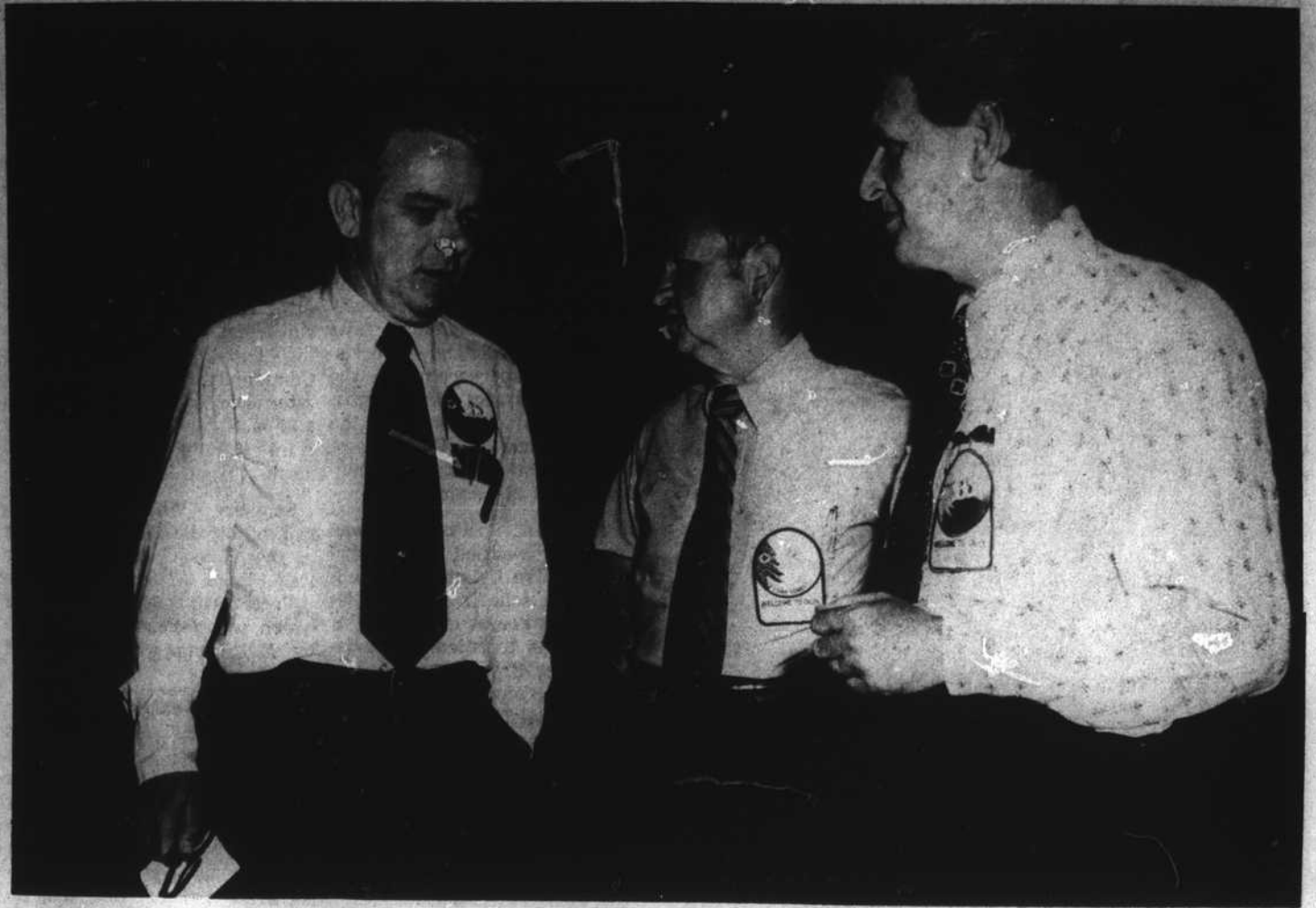

US Forest Service, Recreational Areas Will Open On May 24

Pisgah District Ranger Dan Hile reports that all recreational facilities on the District will be opened to the public May 24th.

Ranger Hile regrets to report that it appears that the new Davidson River Campground, located across from the Ranger Station, will not open this year. Funding for construction of the Sewage Treatment Plant was not received until a few weeks ago. Construction is not expected to be completed before September. The entire 170 family unit campground constructed by Schenck Job Corps will definitely be opened to the public next summer.

The very popular attraction, Sliding Rock, will be opened daily from 9:00 a.m. to 9 p.m. as soon as all lifeguards report for duty. The restroom facilities and the entrance gate will be locked at 9:00 p.m. each evening.

Visitors to Sliding Rock this year will discover a 62 car, six bus parking lot, a large comfort station with flush toilets and warm water showers, walkways with safety railing and, two visitor observation decks. The main attraction, the ROCK, remains unchanged and is slippery as ever.

Visitors to picnic areas and campgrounds will find four and six cubic yard refuse containers instead of individual 32 gal-
