Freak Explosion Injures **Three On Paving Project**

A freak explosion involving road paving equipment injured three workers Monday evening as they were completing paving of US 64 from Hendersonville to Pisgah Forest.

The accident occurred around 8:15 p.m. Monday evening close to the Riverside Shopping Center where the Warren Brothers Paving Company of Asheville had just completed paving 16.4 miles of Highway 64.

The workers were apparently in the process of cleaning up the paving machine when the fumes from the solvent they were using mixed with some hot asphalt, apparently causing the explosion.

The Brevard Volunteer Fire Department sent two trucks to the scene, but fortunately, there was very little fire after the actual explosion.

The Brevard Rescue Squad was called when the foreman of the work crew noticed that one of the men working on the machine at the time of the explosion was missing. It was later verified that the injured worker had already been carried to the Transylvania Community Hospital in an automobile.
