Parent Supervision Urged At Bus Stops

Don Cox, of the traffic safety education division of the N.C. Department of Transportation said in Brevard late last week that he'd like to encourage parents to oversee their youngsters at school bus stops.

The state is becoming alarmed, said Mr. Cox, that seven pupils have died in school bus accidents, five of them at bus stops, since schools opened the last of August.

"And last year there were only five such fatal accidents during the entire school year."

Among the fatalities this year:

In Randolph County a 10-year-old girl was killed when struck by a car while walking to a school bus.

In Catawba County, a five-

year-old girl died when she walked into the path of a non-public school bus while playing along the side of the road after getting off a public school bus.

In Brunswick County a six-year-old girl was killed by a school bus after departing from it.

In Guilford a girl, age 5, was killed by a car while going to her school bus stop.

In Beaufort County a six-year-old boy died after he was struck by a school bus he had just departed from.

One five-year-old girl died on injuries received when the school bus she was riding turned over.

In the other fatality involving a school bus, a 42-year-old woman was killed when her car collided with it.

FOAMCRAFTING

If ever a snowman needed an angel to watch over him, it's our friend "Charlie". Whether it's snowing or not, Charlie Snowman can make even a cloudy day "sunny".

Let Charlie and his angel brighten the faces of children at your house. They're fun to make. Such projects are found in a new book, "A World of Designs With Styrofoam", at most hobby and craft stores.



Charlie Snowman

To make hat, cut out a 3" disk of Styrofoam. Thin disk to 3/4". Glue disk to a 2" wide X 2 1/4" long rod of plastic foam. Paint black.

Use 1-1/2" X 6" X 6" piece of foam for earmuffs, nose, hat brim, eyes, mouth and buttons.

Earmuffs are small ovals 1" long X 3/4" wide X 1/2" thick. Paint bright red. For the headband, cut two slices of plastic foam approximately 1/4" thick X 1/2" wide X 1" long. Paint black.

Cut nine small, irregularly shaped blocks of plastic foam approximately 1/4" X 3/8" X 3/4". Paint black. Carve a 1 1/4" carrot-shaped nose. Paint orange.

To assemble Snowman: Glue 4" ball to center of 6" disk. Glue hat to 3" ball. Glue earmuffs and headband in place. Attach eyes, nose and mouth.

Using toothpicks and glue, attach head to body. Glue buttons in place. Use a 3/4" X 12" length of red felt for muffer and scraps of green felt for "holly berries and leaves". Wrap muffer around neck and pin in place. Highlight muffer and hat with the felt holly berries and leaves, pinned.



Golden Angel

Use a 12" cone of plastic foam for the body, a 6" cone—cut in half—for the arms and flesh colored 3" ball for head.

Fake fur is used for the hair and for the cuff and skirt trim. Gold braid is glued to the front for trim. Eyes are cut from black paper and glued to face. Cut wings using pattern.

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
