They answered, "Yes."

They should also have a fire drill at home, to decide the best ways of getting out of the house if it catches fire, he said.

If you're in bed and there's a fire, ease off the bed onto the floor, he told them. Touch the floor to see if it's cool. Then crawl on your hands and knees to the door. Feel the door and the door knob. If they are cool, open the door slowly.

If you can't get out of the door because of fire, go to the window, knock out all the glass, and jump out, or wait there for the firemen to reach you. They'll be there in a few minutes, he promised.

"Never use gas to start a fire," Asst. Chief Byrd told them. The gas fumes make it very dangerous, and can cause the person to catch fire as well as spread the fire to the rest of the room.

"If you catch fire, lay down and roll over and over. Don't run. That makes the fire burn faster."

One little fellow almost

stumped the firemen when he asked, "What if you're in a room without any windows or doors? How would you get out?"

Asst. Chief Byrd thought it over, then grinned and said, "You get out the same way you got in."

1.5 Million In N. C. Due Tax Refunds

Greensboro — More than 1.5 million North Carolina taxpayers are expected to receive refunds on their 1974 Federal income tax returns, according to Robert A. LeBaube, Internal Revenue Service Director for North Carolina.

During 1974, about 1.5 million North Carolinians received refunds totaling almost \$410 million, an average of about \$272 per taxpayer. Nationwide, the Internal Revenue Service expects to issue refunds worth about \$31.6 billion.

Mr. LeBaube said these refunds are not to be confused with any tax rebate proposed by the President of Congress. Such legislation has not been approved. Taxpayers should

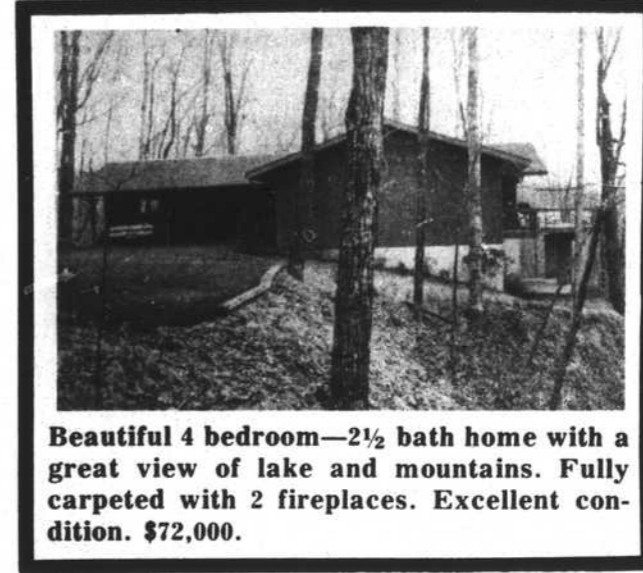
