Prenatal Treatment of Birth Defect Saves Baby's Life

Everyone is happy when a healthy baby is born, but Paul and Theresa Murphy's happiness was shared by all of us here at Boston Floating Hospital when their second daughter, April, arrived. April is lucky to be alive. A greater miracle is that she is completely healthy.

The Murphy's first child, Heather, died in early infancy, despite all efforts to save her. A postmortem examination did not reveal the cause of death. Because we suspected an inherited disorder of metabolism, special chemical tests were performed on the fraction of an ounce of the child's urine which remained after she died. The mystery was solved when laboratory findings showed that the baby had had methylmalonic acidemia, a rare, often fatal, disease which can also cause mental retardation.

In a genetic counseling session with the Murphys, who desperately wanted to have another child, I explained that the disease could be present in

other children they might have. There are two major forms. In one type, an enzyme is missing. In the other, the enzyme is present, but vitamin B₁₂, which activates the enzyme to do its job, is not used efficiently.

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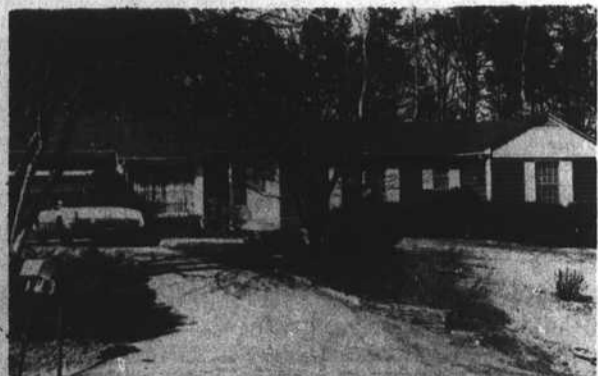
