Nine grades in the Transylvania Schools entered the poster contest, with five grades entering the essay contest, according to Mr. Shuford.

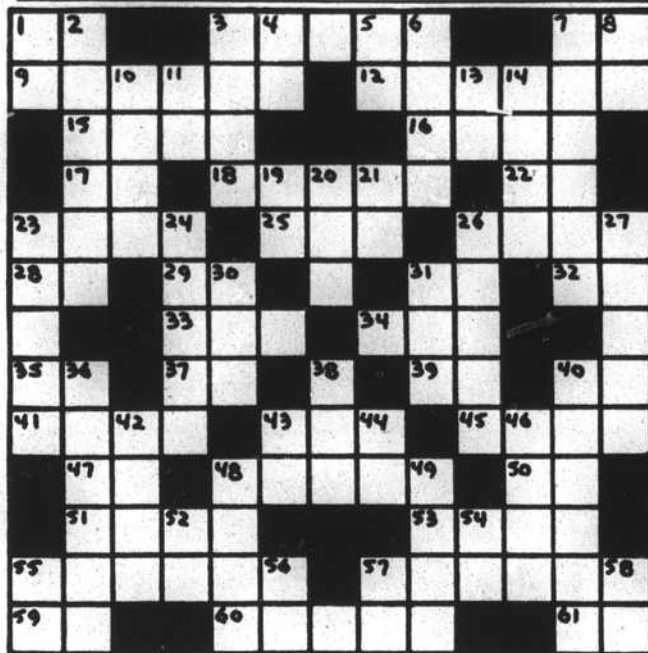

Pruning, Not Shearing, Provides Natural Look

If your evergreens haven't been pruned yet, it should be done within the next few weeks, or well in advance of warm spring weather.

"To get the natural look, prune to preserve the plant's natural form," suggests Henry J. Smith, North Carolina State University extension landscape horticulturist.

The first rule of thumb is, don't cut away an identical amount from each branch or limb.

There is a difference between pruning and shearing, Smith pointed out. Shearing is when all branches are cut to the same length and the plant assumes an unnatural shape. Sometimes this is desirable. Hemlock, pine and similar plants can be sheared into a hedge.

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
