## An Ancient Cannon With Sun-Glass Is An Edenton Relic

Edenton, Oct. 9. Edenton offers another ancient curio for public notice—a miniature cannon reposing on a large sun dial with a magnifying lens above it directed at the weapon's touchhole. It is evidently a replica of a similarly operated cannon of shootable size in use 300 or 400 years ago. Joseph G. Campen, local jeweler, has the souvenir and it is supposed, like most legendary tales here, to have come over with the Sir Walter Raleigh group and is so focused that when the sun reaches a certain designated line on the dial its rays will ignite powder about the fire-hole, causing a consequent explosion and discharge—an old-time ancestor of the bombs used in modern warfare and especially favored by anarchist assassins. The relic is not for sale.

mander John A. Holmes, vice commanders West Byrum, J. A. Bunch and O. B. Perry, and Oscar H. Brown as adjutant and finance officer.

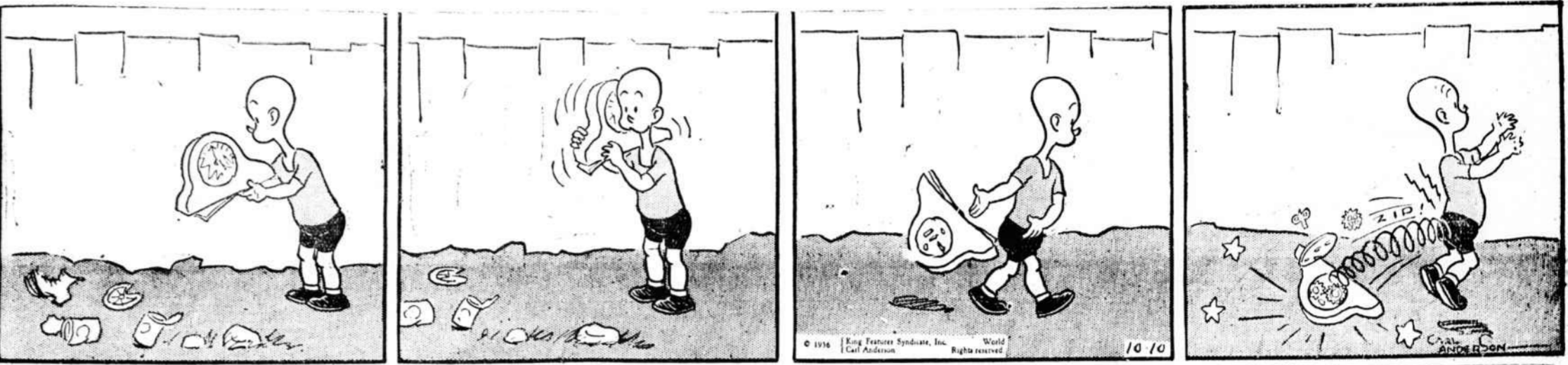

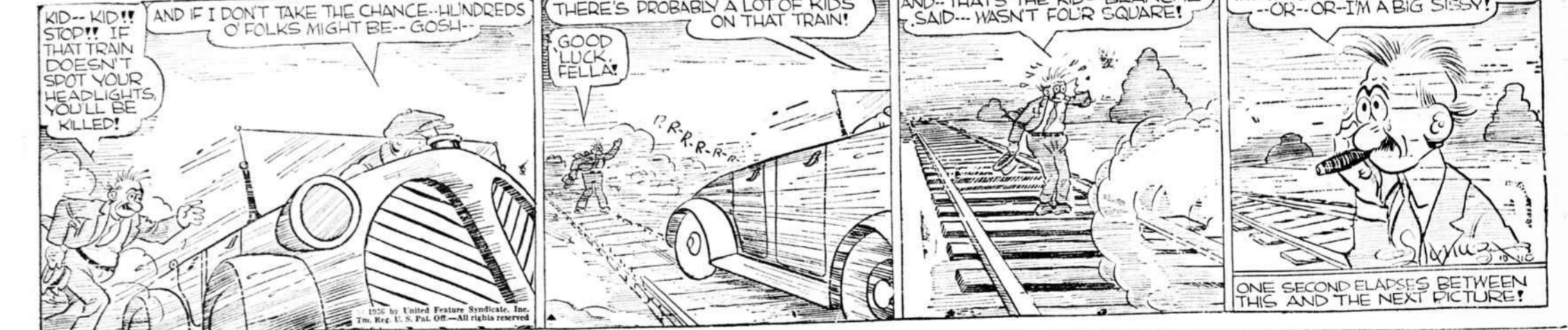
