THE OHIO DEMOCRATS' COUNCIL.

The State Convention of Ohio that met in Cleveland on Wednesday was a large Convention of earnest Democrats and although there was much opposition from the county of Hamilton in which Cincinnati is situated, Governor Campbell was nominated by a very large majority. The opposition to him was very violent and to the last the Hamilton county delegates refused to withdraw their opposition and make the nomination unanimous. After the nomination Governor Campbell was escorted into the hall where the Convention met and addressed the Convention in a ringing speech, full of fire and enthusiasm, that held up the Republican party to the detestation of the audience and elicited such applause. The tariff question, which will be the main issue in the canvass he presented to the Convention with great force and plainness. The inharmonious character of the body after Gov. Campbell was nominated did not appear to dampen his ardor or confidence and he will go into the fight in this contest, which is not only an important one for Ohio, but in its effects upon the national Presidential election of 1892, for the whole Union. His speech is evidence of the heroic democracy of Gov. Campbell. He is a straight out Democrat upon all the questions that divide the Democrats and Republicans, and if he succeeds in this election in Ohio as he has done before, he will be invited to a higher seat in the National Convention of the Democratic party.

The platform of the Ohio Democracy, after commending the administration of Gov. Campbell, expresses its opposition to all class legislation; favors a tariff to furnish revenue sufficient to defray the expenses of the government economically administered; accepts the issue tendered by the Republican party in the McKinley tariff act; favors a graded income tax; denounces the demonstration of silver and demands the registration of the constitution; and with the equal right of each to free and unlimited coinage; denounces the extravagance of the Republican Congress which had exhausted a surplus and created a deficit in the Treasury; which had substituted despotic rule for free discussion in the House of Representatives; congratulates the people on the defeat of the force bill; favors close commercial relations with Canada; favors just pensions to retiring soldiers; and denounces Russian persecutions of the Jewish race. These were the most important planks in the platform. After the other State nominations, the convention adjourned.

TOWN MEETING... DON'T FORGET TO EXAMINE McCLURE & GRICE'S... SOUTH CAROLINA AND THE ALLIANCE... South Carolina, in which the Farmers Alliance has had its most signal success as a factor in politics, is now showing signs of revolt among those who were the most conspicuous instruments of its success.

Gov. Tillman who has made more out of the Alliance movement than any other man in South Carolina and who has used the Alliance political leaders in the gratification of his political ambition, is now the chief object of their hostility because of his opposition to the Subtreasury scheme of the Alliance. Gov. Tillman appears to be a man of outrageous convictions and has given his opposition a practical direction by challenging the Alliance leaders to a discussion of the Subtreasury question. The challenge was accepted and their able lecturer, Talbert and the formidable Ben. Terrell, of Texas, were sent into South Carolina to hold an oratorical combat with the

traitor Tillman. When the first encounter took place in Edgfield (behind closed doors) the champions of the Alliance subtreasury were completely worsted. It was debated for four hours and it is said that it was so feebly supported that its advocates declined to put the question to a vote. A reaction against the Subtreasury appears to be setting in and in evidence the Farmers Alliance of Newberry county, South Carolina, have passed resolutions emphatically condemning it.

Unoubtedly the great mistake of this popular upheaval of the farmers was in suffering it to fall into the hands of selfish leaders who have made it an aggressive political machine for their own advancement. These leaders soon made it a seer political body, and to make their leadership more secure they excluded the more intelligent classes of every community, and the consequence has been, as predicted, a revolt of the sober second thought of the most intelligent farmers, and the result may be an injury to the most numerous and best class of men in the Southern States.

It is true that the Alliance has done much good for the farmer, but it is also true that it has done much harm. It has done much good by bringing the farmer into contact with the world, and by teaching him the value of his own labor. It has done much harm by excluding the intelligent classes of every community, and by making its leadership more secure by excluding the more intelligent classes of every community.

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
