CUBA.

The people of the United States are tired of this inhuman butchery in the Island of Cuba. The public sentiment of the country favors the granting belligerent rights to Cuba in its struggle for independence, and many of them favor active material aid by the United States Government. Farther than that, we do not think our people wish to go Annexation we think they are opposed to, on account of the character of a large portion of the population. We believe the Administration of President McKinley is in sympathy with the popular sentiment regarding Cuba.

But if rumors be true it has placed our Government in a hu miliating attitude in instruct ing our foreign representatives to find out in a diplomatic way whether they would take sides with Spain in case a conflict should arise between Spain and the United States regarding Cuba. It is a tacit acknowledgement of weakness on our part. It is not in keeping with the bold attitude of the "Monroe Doctrine." It is a confession of weakness that invites aggression on the part of the powers. If the international policy of our government toward Cuba and Spain be correct then it is our duty to pursue the right without regard to the opinions of European powers, if wrong, then our duty is to discard it.

The sneak policy ascribed to the administration at Washington is not only a humiliation to our foreign representatives. but it is already producing the fruits of national indecision. By the same winds that brought us the news of instructions to our foreign representatives brought also the news that their enquiries had been treated with contempt and that our diplomats had been snubbed by the foreign powers in violation of all the rules of international comity.

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
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
