EVACUATION OF CUBAAND PORTO RICO

The Spanish and American commissioners have met at the Captain General's Palace in Havana, and in the council chamber of the Palace in Porto Rico to enter upon negotiations for the Spanish evacuation of the two islands and yielding the Spanish sovernignty to the United States government. The American Commissioners were received by Captain General Blanco in the Pa ace and after formal courtesies they held a secret session behind closed doors which lasted only a short time. It is thought that the settlement and evacuation will be accomplished without delay, and that the Commissioners of the United States will be liberal and magnamious in their terms of agreement.

There were no demonstrations of hostility or approbation by the Spanish population but there was great curiosity to see the Steamer Resolute in which the American Commissioners had been brought over to Cuba, and immense crowds gathered at the dock to see the American At Porto Rico the American Com-

missioners have arrived at San Juan and notified Captain General Macias of the Spanish government of their readiness to enter upon negotiations for the evacuation of Porto Rice and the surrender of the sovreignty of the island to the United States under the agreement of the two countries. There was no ex planation of the delay and the American Commissioners sent a note to the Captain General asking for an explanation. The note was carried by an officer of Commodore Schley's staff, who was struck by a brick hurled at him from the crowd, which struck him on the leg and fell at his feet, doing no serious injury. Soon after, the Captain General notified the American Commissioners that he would be ready to receive them on the following-day.
