### Yellow Fever.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 17.-Dr. Neal Mitchell, President of the Board of Health, issued the following official bulletin for the twenty four hours ending at 6 p. m., to day: New cases, 59; deaths, 2. Total cases to date, 3,627; total deaths, 318. Deaths--Edward Bell colored; Theresa, daughter of Capt. W. C. Cooper, of Springfield, a suburb.

DECATUR, Ala., Oct. 17.--There were three cases of yellow fever today, all colored. No deaths.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Oct. 17.--Montgomery has removed her quarantine regulations against all points in Alabama, except Decatur, and against Jackson, Miss.
