THE FAIR ASSOCIATION WINS CASE BEFORE JUDGE CONNER

The suit of Smith and others against the Cape Fear Fair Association came up for hearing yesterday before Judge Conner.

The question was whether the 65 persons who offered to become members of the Fair Association and paid their dues in advance to the amount of about \$200 were members entitled to vote as such.

It will be remembered that the officials of the Fair Association refused to allow them to participate in the election of officials at the January meeting and their attorneys Messrs. Davis and Shadrock appealed to the Supreme Court. Judge Conner declined to sustain the appeal and it is possible the case will be appealed to the Supreme Court.

The whole truth of the matter is that there is a desire to change the old officials while the officials were not quite ready to quit.

That is all there is in the case. Whether this is best or not is another question and the individual can pass upon that as he thinks best.

WONT DECLARE WAR UNTIL NEED MADE CERTAIN

The State Department Expects Austrian Break in the Near Future Unless Stand Is Changed

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 22—President Wilson has practically decided to appear before Congress prior to adjournment March 4 to ask for additional authority to protect American seamen and ships.

There was indications that he will make his address later this week or next.

The President's position as outlined authoritatively today, is that congress before adjourning should pass a broad resolution giving him additional authority. He has definitely decided what he will say to congress, but that has not been made public.

Officials generally expect that sooner or later arms will be furnished to American ships. In spite of the statement of the British government that only a small percentage of vessels going through the danger zone are being sunk, officials pointed out that most American vessels are being held up.

It was emphasized today that when the President appeared before congress he will do so with the purpose of declaring war. It is realized that the pacifist element in congress has some strength but the President is known to believe the situation is such that when action is needed there will be little division.

The President has decided not to call an extra session unless there should be an unusual emergency.

While secrecy was maintained it is said the State Department believes the negotiations with Austria so far have been unsatisfactory. Ultimately a break is expected unless Austria changes her position.

At the State Department it was said that the situation continued to be as serious as it could be short of war. The Department received after the cabinet meeting a dispatch from Consul Frost at Queenstown, announcing the sinking by shell fire of the Norwegian steamer Dalbeattie, with two native Americans in her crew. The Consul said the Dalbeattie stopped at the first shot, but the submarine continued shelling while the ship was being abandoned and offered no assistance to the crew. After being on the sea in their boats for about 18 hours, the men were rescued.

This is one of a number of instances in which reports to the Department tell of violations of neutral rights and endangering or taking of neutral life. All available information about such cases is being assembled for the President.

Secretary Lansing would not discuss the situation with Austria either before or after the cabinet meeting. He would not comment on the side memoire handed to the Vienna government by Ambassador Penfield asking specifically whether Austria had repudiated her pledges given the United States after the sinking of the Ancona and the Persia.
