Happenings of This and Other Nations Far Seven Days Ago

THE NEWS OF THE SOUTH

What is Taking Place in the South and Will Be Found in Brief Paragraphs

Domestic

Cook (Clavin), clerk of the United States court for the southern district of Georgia, has been indicted by the federal grand jury at Macon for the embezzlement of \$15,000 of government funds and for making false statements to the attorney general as to his accounts.

Perhaps the most extraordinary record set in all the records of the Sixty-fifth congress was the voting of more than twenty-one billions of dollars for the first year of the war without a dissenting voice in either house.

Notice to the public to make its tax returns to the government under the new war revenue tax law has been issued. All individuals receiving incomes of \$1,000 and over come under the operation of the new law.

It is estimated that more congressmen are expected to be re-elected than in any previous year. The newspapers generally are expected to preserve the interests of the country in the protection of the new laws.

Majority law people want can possibly secure the new war revenue law. It is expected that every man and woman will make returns to the Federal treasury as soon as possible.

Following a conference between representatives of the freight clerks of the N. C. & St. L. and the W. & A., who walked out in Atlanta, officials of the roads, at which no agreement was reached, a formal order for a general strike of all members of the order of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks on these two roads was issued by J. J. Forrester, grand president of the order.

The Greater Savannah Commercial Club adopted resolutions asking for the expulsion from the United States senate of Senator Thomas W. Hardwick of Georgia, declaring that his published utterances and antagonistic attitude toward the government demanded that such be done.

Twelve people were injured, the majority only slightly when one of the big trolley cars of the Stone Mountain line turned turtle on a sharp curve just behind Agnes Scott college in Decatur, Ga., killing a negro and making a mass of wreckage out of the car.

In Newark, N. J., the offices of the New Jersey Free Zeitung were raided by federal authorities and the publisher, Benedict Pruth, and two editors, William von Kaeperler and Henry Wechter were taken into custody. The men were arraigned before the United States commissioner charged with publishing seditious matter.

A price of 50 cents a pound to the farmer was agreed upon at a meeting in New Orleans of men interested in marketing and growing of cotton in ten Southern states as being justified by the present selling prices of manufactured cotton products.

Southern farmers in a meeting at New Orleans went on record as opposed to a general fixing of the price of cotton and urged instead the creation of an official marketing board through which to obtain a correct estimate of a fair and equitable price.

European

Naval aircraft bombing St. Denis, Western, the Zeppelin took notice, the British docks and other targets and Thouron railway junction, and this again French and English remonstrated against the Germans for their air raids on French and English cities. Some think that this is the beginning of the 'battle of the air' about which the world has talked for 2,000 years.

Frankfort-on-the-Main was bombed by airplanes and five people are reported to have been killed.

Zeppelin bombers had been fined \$100000 for the giving of food and cigarettes to passing English prisoners.

London announced that the Austrian force at the front numbers 306,000 men.

The German minister to Argentina has been ordered to leave Argentina. Things got so low for him that his friends spirited him out and placed him aboard a Spanish steamer.

The British in London, it is reported, are getting ready for another hack at the German lines.

The best fighting, accompanied with the most consistent gains, thus far in the war, has been done by the Italians. Not since they entered the war have they been on the defensive, and their campaign has been one long advance. They now practically control the Adriatic sea, and it is only a question of a few weeks till they will have taken the greatest part of the head of that sea, Trieste.

An Austrian officer was killed in a naval battle in the Adriatic between an Austrian warship and an Italian destroyer. The warship got away, however.

The N. J. Oct. 20 while of Pittsburg who pleaded guilty to impersonating a son of Secretary Daniels was sentenced today to two years in the Federal penitentiary at Atlanta, Ga. Through passing as young Daniel Levy obtained loans and letters to prominent persons and succeeded also in gaining admittance to the New York navy yard.

Rev. A. H. Porter passed through the city yesterday en route to Steadman where he and Rev. W. H. Huggings of Salem are holding a protracted meeting this week.

Fort Worth, Tex., Oct. 8—Poolville, Parker county, near here, has raised \$1,246.50 as a reward for the delivery of the German Emperor into the American authorities. Practically every male resident of the town contributed.

In his charge to the grand jury at Greensboro the other day Judge Harding had a few remarks to make on the man who would not pay his debts. He said that a man who owed the state had not paid his taxes, was barred by law from sitting on the grand jury, and he thought that a man who intentionally dodged his private debts was more unworthy of being a juror; that the law required a man to be of good character to be eligible as grand juror; that no matter how moral and good a man might be if he was a debt dodger there was a cloud on his title to good citizenship. That was pretty caustic language, but it contained a great deal of truth. It is said that some years ago in reconstruction days, there was a church in an eastern county of this state which allowed no man to be a member who did not pay his debts and vote the Democratic ticket—Wilmington Dispatch.

Spartanburg, S. C. Oct. 8—Lieutenant Randall M. Mattson, of Rochester, N. Y., member of the military police, was shot and painfully wounded last night by William Lands, who was suspected of selling liquor to soldiers and Lands in turn was shot five times by Lieutenant Mattson. Mattson will recover, but Lands' wounds are thought to be fatal.

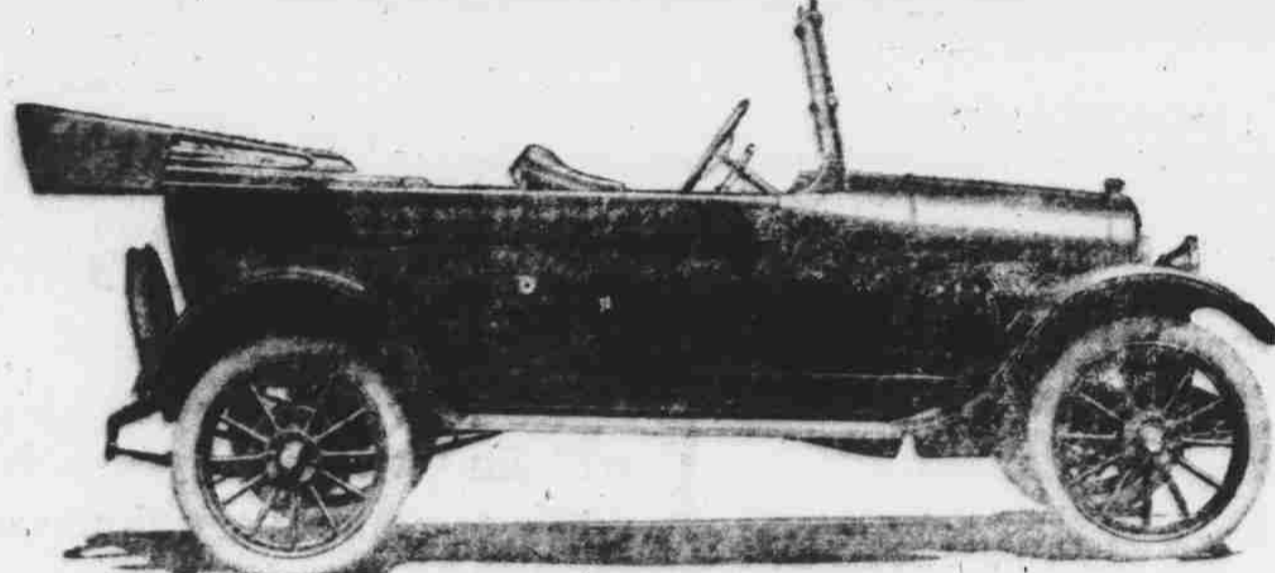
