

Washington Oct. 22 Five classifications into which in awaiting drafting will be divided under the new regulations approved by President Wilson have become published much before the time planned by the Provost Marshal General's office and are here published:

The classifications are as follows and show every man registered to which class he belongs in what order the different classifications will be called to service.

CLASS NO. 1

Single men without dependent relatives.

Married men or widowers without children who habitually fail to support his family.

Married men dependent on their wives for support.

Married men or widowers without children supported by income independent of his labor.

Men not included within either description in this order or other classes.

CLASS NO. 2

Married men or father of motherless children, usefully engaged but the family has sufficient income apart from his daily labor to afford reasonably adequate support during his absence.

Married men no children, wife can support herself decently and without hardship.

Skilled farm laborer engaged in necessary industrial enterprises.

Skilled industrial laborer engaged in necessary agricultural enterprises.

CLASS NO. 3

Man with foster children dependent on daily labor for support.

Man with aged infant, disabled parents or grandparents dependent on daily labor for support.

Man with brothers or sisters incompetent to support themselves dependent on daily labor for support.

County or municipal officers.

Fireman or police.

Necessary artisans or workmen in arsenals armories and navy yards.

Necessary custom house clerks.

Persons necessary in the transmission of mails.

Necessary employees in service of United States.

Highly specialized administrative experts.

Technical or mechanical experts in industrial enterprises.

Highly specialized agricultural experts in agriculture for reasons of state or nation.

Assistant or associate manager of necessary industrial enterprises.

Assistant or associate manager of necessary agricultural enterprises.

CLASS NO. 4

Mature men with wives or children or widower's with children dependent on daily labor for support and another reason than age or physical condition.

Officer of merchant marine.

Regular ordained ministers.

Students of divinity.

Persons in military or naval service.

Aliens.

Alien enemies.

Persons morally unfit.
