Helping to Lose The War

The two greatest dangers confronting this country are not submarines and German bullets but the strikers and price boosters. Those who nominally loyal are the greatest allies and agencies aiding the German government. Added to them is the so-called Socialist party which bears the brand "Made in Germany" and serving slavishly that is willingly, if unwillingly, hampering the allies and leading its influence to the German cause.

Of course it is natural for the laborer and food producer to exact every penny possible for his work and there are times that it is wrong, unrighteous but patriotic and unrighteous. This is one of the times.

"Any other class, soldiers or aristocrats' liberty are hanging in the balance, the German tiger is wounded but still ferocious, untiring and full of fight. It is nothing less than suicidal to weaken our own forces under these circumstances but is just what the price boosters, strikers and socialists are doing.

If you know any soldiers or any kind try to prevail upon them to be patriotic now and not wait until some calamity comes which they are aiding to bring on. They should take a line of reasonable prices of food, labor and everything else. I don't mind the last penny. That is robbery and not patriotism. Do unto others as you would have them do unto you, live and let live.

Now is the time to sow wheat in this section. If you sow it earlier the insects are liable to kill it and if you wait much longer it will not take root in time to keep the cold winter from killing it.

Wheat is like most everything else it is necessary to have your ground in good shape before sowing and it is necessary to put something under in the nature of a fertilizer.

You might make some wheat without, but it pays to fertilize and a good drill is worth considerable more than the extra cost. You can sow by hand but it is not advisable unless no drill can be secured.

Wheat is always sown and if any fellow talks to you about planting wheat run him off for he doesn't know a thing about raising wheat. It is just as bad as to talk about sowing potatoes.

The Index has preached wheat raising in season and out of season for the past five years and the Cape Fear section will never be in any better shape financially until it learns to raise its own supplies

including wheat, corn and meat.

There are fellows that argue it is cheaper to raise cotton to buy this but if you will show us one of these farmers who is not always in bad shape we will have his picture taken and published once to the world as the greatest living curiosity. Send him along if you know him.
