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Bolsheviki Proclaim Papers State Property.

Detonated Thursday, Nov. 22.—The Bolsheviki have issued a decree providing for the requisitioning from the wealthier classes of warm apparel for the army. They are required to furnish one blanket and one article of clothing in good condition.

The decree, issued yesterday, proclaiming all newspaper advertisements to be the property of the state, provides that only governmental or soldiers' and workers' publications have the right to publish advertisements, under penalty of confiscation. The advertisement agencies are required to deposit their money in the designated publications. The decree affects periodicals, pamphlets, posters and other display advertisements and provides for the confiscation of plants for the printing of advertisements.

Thus far no bourgeois dailies have resumed publication, only the socialist papers being permitted to appear. The publishers of the socialist organs propose a general suspension as a protest.

Stu art Uges Action on Fact Whipple's Utterances.

Richmond, Va., Nov. 23.—Governor Henry C. Stuart today stated that he had called upon Armistead C. Cavin, rector of the University of Virginia, at noon upon him a prompt meeting of the board of visitors of that institution to take action on the recent utterances attributed to Prof. Lewis R. Whipple, director of the school of journalism at the university, in his recent speech at Sweetbriar College. Mr. Gordon, it is stated, has already called a meeting of the board.

The governor said: "I am of the opinion that action in this case should be prompt and vigorous. Men of Professor Whipple's way of thinking should find no countenance anywhere in Virginia."

At a meeting in Lynchburg today the Lynchburg chapter of University alumni association unreservedly condemned Professor Whipple's utterances and demanded that he be immediately dismissed from the faculty. Meetings of the alumni in Richmond and Danville also have been called to take action.

Thousands of Lawyers Tender Their Services

Washington, Nov. 24.—Several thousand lawyers have offered their services to the judge advocate general's department. They are organized in a "lawyers' committee" to advise the judge advocate general and to represent the military organization and proper governmental policy, and the statute law itself, all tend to prohibit the general acceptance of these offers. The army can avail itself of such offers only to a limited extent and for special service. But the spirit that prompts them is worthy of the highest appreciation of the department, the army and of the public. About 150 lawyers have been commissioned in the grade of major and judge advocate and are now serving in the army.

In time of peace the judge advocate general's department consisted of but 2 officers. It now consists of more than 12 times that number. The department is the official legal adviser of the entire military establishment. Under and for the secretary of war, it is the judge of the legal correctness of all military administration, all disciplinary action and of all matters affecting the rights and mutual relationship of the personnel. It is its duty to advise the secretary of war and the commander-in-chief as to what the law is and whether military administration is lawfully conducted.

German Propagandists Fall Out on a New Scheme.

New York, Nov. 23.—A new means adopted by German propagandists to spread reports of suffering and heavy losses among the American expeditionary force in France has been unearthed by government agents. It was an ingenious ruse.

Letters describing imaginary attacks on the French front by the American soldiers have been sent out and scattered in large numbers and in which the general ex-dictor was described as being picked up in an airplane, hotel lobby, and other public places. These letters, which purport to come from unknown sources, are signed only with first names. All of those sent have been pre-dated, three to four weeks.

A poster displayed as a sample of the propaganda was "Dear Sister Lillian"—It described a "battle" in which 183 United States troops were supposed to have been killed and 500 wounded.

We Spaulding Injured in France.

Paris, Nov. 25.—The Spaulding of Haverhill, Mass., a member of the American army, was killed in the last battle of the Meuse-Argonne offensive. He was killed by a shell which struck him in the chest. He was 28 years old and was a private in the 101st Infantry.

War, A Woman's War, Man-Made in Germany.

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 25.—Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, chair man of the Woman's Committee of the National Council of Defense at a mass-meeting of Maryland mothers today termed the war "a women's war, man-made in Germany." She declared the greatest proof of patriotism in women was the fact that they gave their sons to war.

"We must send our boys away with a smile on our face," she said. "The time for tears must be after they are gone. Let our children know that they live in the land where men are willing to die and where women are willing to give all for their country. All the world is calling to the womanhood and the motherhood of America."

Dr. Shaw urged a "smokeless Friday" for men at home and that they send the tobacco so saved to the men in the field. A message to America's men in the service was drafted and will be sent to the various units Christmas. It is: "The women of America are with you in spirit and in service. You are our standard-bearers, and our hope. We love you, believe in you and pray for you this Christmas more."

Users of Explosives Must Secure Federal Licenses.

A Federal license is now required in the United States for the legal possession of explosives, any person having explosives and not having a license therefor being subject to a fine of \$5,000 and imprisonment for one year.

Only citizens of the United States and friendly countries may obtain licenses. The purchaser of dynamite must state definitely what the explosive is to be used for when obtaining his license, and will be held accountable for its use as stated and the return of any that may be left.

With the strict enforcement of this law the Federal authorities hope to prevent explosives falling into the hands of evilly disposed persons, and to put a stop to all further dynamite plots.
