Charlotte, N. C., Nov. 25.—The first contingent of negro troops to be quartered at Camp Green arrived yesterday when about 500 colored enlisted men and about twenty officers of the same race arrived from Camp Bartlett, Westfield, Mass. These troops constitute the first and second separate companies of Massachusetts and Connecticut and have a strength of about 250 enlisted men each, being part of the depot brigades of the Twenty-third Division, National Guard. The first negro infantry regiment, constituted by Col. F. J. T. Smith, president of the Negro National Bank, was organized in Boston last month and has been serving the front line in France since October. This unit also is a part of the Twenty-third Division.

### First Negro Troops Arrive at Charlotte.

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Lenox Aviators Drop Two Thousand Feet and Escape Death.

Newport News, Va., Nov. 25.—Major H. F. Lincoln, of Fox Monroe, and Paul Wright, both at Langley Field, yesterday afternoon fell 2,000 feet when an airplane driven by Wright stalled flying, refused to maneuver controls and dropped into a pond near the field. The machine actually worked, but the two escaped with minor injuries. Major Lincoln sustaining a broken nose and Wright severe lacerations and bruises. The machine was almost directly above the pond when the accident occurred. Wright who was carrying the Major and passengers, hastened to walk the ground towards the center of the pond before it struck. Witnesses say the water and mud was all that saved the men's lives.

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### Petterson Here for Court Term

Major George L. Petterson former Paymaster General charged with the embezzlement of \$7,000 of State funds during his term of office, arrived yesterday from Columbia, S. C., in compliance with bond he furnished Justice of the Peace J. E. Owens recently for appearance at the term of court which begins today. Judge C. C. Lyon will preside at this term of criminal court, but the case of State v. Petterson will not be tried. Solicitor Herbert E. Norris yesterday stated that an agreement for a continuance had been reached.

The agreement to this effect, according to Solicitor Norris was reached recently when Attorney General Manning thought that he would be in Concord this week assisting in the trial of Gaston Means. Since that time Attorney General Manning has found that it is not in accord with the Governor's wishes that he assist in that trial, but no change has been made in regard to the trial of the Petterson case.

The Solicitor will present the matter to the grand jury and all the preliminaries, it is expected will be gone through with this week; among which will be the renewal of Major Petterson's bond. —News and Observer.

### Germans Launch Counter Attack.

Berlin, Nov. 25.—German garrisons launched a counter-attack last night against the British troops who had pushed forward as far as Bourlon village west of Cambrai, and after desperate bayonet fighting drove them back to their former positions, the German general staff announced today. Thick waves of British infantry, the statement adds, four times fruitlessly stormed the village of Inchy, west of Bourlon.

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
