Vigorous Protest to France Planned

Washington, Dec. 15.—Following the cabinet meeting yesterday, it was learned that this government will send immediately a note to France protesting vigorously against the action of the commander of the French cruiser Descartes in holding up and searching American vessels in the vicinity of the West Indies.

It was stated on good authority that the note will demand that the French government order the release at once of the persons taken off the ships Coamo and Carolina. The cabinet discussed the French note in length, and it was determined to make it fully as vigorous as the one sent to Great Britain protesting against her interference with American trade.
