HOTELS AND VICE.

Charlotte aldermen have voted to revoke the license of three of the so-called "hotels" on account of the immoral conditions which exist in these places. The ordinance was enforced in Charlotte and started in Greensboro the argument of the Fayetteville's intusians who tell of hotel conditions in Greensboro.

If this statement is true then it is some that at least one place besides Charlotte makes up to a class of folks claiming to run hotels.

The Raleigh Times, commenting along this line, says:

The circumstances, disgraceful as they are reported to have become, existed primarily by reason of the laxity of the city administration rather than the viciousness of the hotels. Had the police wished to do so, they could have prosecuted the obnoxious patrons in a manner which would have quickly dissipated their attempt to use the hotels as their field of operations. One or two raids would have had a deterrent effect upon both the hotel parasites and the hotel management.

THE FIGHT ON BRANDEIS.

The Durham Sun says:

The entire legal profession is on trial before the people of this republic in the fight against the confirmation of Louis Brandeis as justice of the United States Supreme Court. The charges against Brandeis are not that he betrayed humanity by selling his services to the highest bidder, or that he has committed any crime which has committed any crime. The real reason for the bitter opposition to him appears to be that he was an honest man as well as a good lawyer, and that in the practice of his profession he never forgot his duty to justice and to humanity.

It is humiliating to be forced even to mention as another reason for the hostility to him, the fact that he is a Jew.

Louis Brandeis is admittedly one of the country's great lawyers. He is a student and expert from his class, because he has a sense of obligation to society and has refused to sell his talent to the highest bidder.

Some of the selfish men in this profession have doubtless resented the unselfishness of Brandeis in repeatedly giving the public his legal service without compensation.

The people of this republic need just such lawyers and men of Brandeis in their court of last resort, and now is the time for them to move as forcibly as they can to demand that their countrymen should not be deceived by the speech-mongers of the "Jew-baiting" party.

IN MEMORY OF THEIR DEEDS.

The Greensboro News pays this deserved tribute to the heroes of the Lost Cause:

"The little green tents where the soldiers sleep, where the children play and the women weep, are gay with flowers today. Rue, for remembrance, and pansies, for thoughts, and here and there a little heart's-ease - let the roses, and the lilies and the Oriental chrysanthemums that deck the battle-flags of great nations be passed by for the day; the south remembers her dead not with drums and trumpets, for the glamor of their triumphs, but in silence and with tears befitting the love they bore her.

For the blazonry, the pomp and pageantry of military glory may surround the tomb of a tyrant as soon as that of a patriot; the splendor of illustrious deeds of arms gilds the name of Napoleon as well as that of Lee. It is the tribute of silence and tears that is rare. We need no blare of bugles and ruffle of drums on the Tenth of May, for we go out to celebrate less the genius of our captains and the valor of our men than the love of country that made them skillful and valiant.

The Army of the Confederacy is not dead. The guns and the horses and the men have crumbled into dust long ago; but the spirit that made them terrible hovers over every little mound, aspires to heaven in every granite shaft. If ever the south should be called to stand in battle array again it will wake in the hearts of these men's sons; and whatever uniform that new army may wear, whatever flag floats above it, the spirit that drives it to victory will be largely the memory of the deeds of the men in the little green tents.
