

WE ARE SAVING OURSELVES IN ORDER TO UNITE IN FINAL LEAD OF NATIONS—WILSON

President Wilson in a Speech at the Summer White House Predicted His Re-Election and That the Democratic Party Would Win in New York State.—Reports From Ohio Particularly Pleasing.

(By International News Service.) Ashbury Park, October 14.—President Wilson addressing five thousand voters, most of them Pennsylvania Democrats, assembled at Shadow Lawn this afternoon predicted his own re-election as a certainty. He also predicted that his party would win New York State. In a direct answer to the Progressive vote the President lauded the work of the national convention held by that party, but said that the delegates had been deceived and betrayed. Mr. Wilson sounded a warning against the danger of electing a Democratic President and a Republican Congress. He said: "A President without Congress is absurd and useless. He can get you into trouble but he cannot get you out." Referring to the subject of peace and the charge of the Republicans that the administration policy has been weak in dealing with the European belligerents he said: "We are saving ourselves in order that we may unite in that final lead of nations in which it shall be understood that there is no neutrality where any nation is doing wrong." Vance McCormick, chairman of the Democratic National Committee was given a greeting by the Pennsylvania visitors as the next governor of the State. Former representative Palmer in introducing Mr. Wilson proclaimed him as the greatest living Progressive. Eight special trains today brought three thousand Pennsylvania Democrats to the summer White House to celebrate Pennsylvania Day. The President today received reports from the Middle West and expressed himself as gratified over the situation in that part of the country. Reports from Ohio were particularly pleasing to the President. The President is scheduled to speak in Cincinnati on October 26. He will deliver an address in Chicago next Thursday.

TRACING ANCESTRY BACK TO HAPSBURG

Trace Their Ancestry Back to the House of Hapsburg and Lorraine.

Following from the News and Observer: An interesting fact in connection with the unveiling of this city tomorrow of a portrait of the late Dr. George W. Long, is that this family, which is one of the best known in the State, traces its ancestry back to the House of Hapsburg and Lorraine. This is through the Albright side of the family. The grandmother of Judge R. F. Long, I. L. D.; Col. J. A. Long, Daniel Albright Long, I. L. D.; William Samuel Long, I. L. D.; and the late George Washington Long, M. D., was an Albright. A G. Albright, of Hoxie, Ark., is a member of the same family, which he has traced back as stated to the House of Hapsburg and Lorraine. The Arkansas man has ascertained that the most of the Albrights in America trace from Hendrich Albright and Anna Folsom Albright, who came from Germany and settled in New York near the present city of Albany prior to the Revolutionary war.

NAVAL AEROPLANES PLACED ON PATROL DUTY ON ATLANTIC COAST

International News Service Newport, October 14.—United States Naval aeroplanes today were placed on patrol duty along the coast and in search of any secret submarine base the Germans may have established on the coast. The aviation ship North Carolina arrived here today with full equipment of flying machines and will co-operate with destroyers up and down the coast. Some extension of the coast patrol was announced today.

AUSTRIAN EXECUTED BY HIS OWN MEN

Young Austrian Executed After Returning Home for Joining Italian Troops.

Vienna, October 14.—The Austro-Hungarian government has published details of the case of Lieutenant Damiano Chiesa, an Italian artillery officer, who was shot after his capture by the troops of the Dual Monarchy. The lieutenant was a native of Rovereto and the son of a member of the Austrian diet. Before the war he studied law at the Italian university of Padua. Late in the fall of 1914 the young man returned to his native city to start a revolutionary agitation against the Austrian government. A few days before Italy declared war he fled across the border with a few sympathizers and entered the Italian army as a lieutenant of artillery under an assumed name. Early last Spring he was sent to the front in Turin to assist in the bombardment of his native city. As he knew the town and its surroundings perfectly he was able to give valuable aid to the Italians, but in May he fell into the hands of the Austrians with his entire battery. After his capture he was recognized by several Tyrolean soldiers and he finally admitted that he was the fugitive son of the representative of Rovereto. Disowned by his father, who would not ask for mercy for him, the lieutenant was tried before a court martial and sentenced to be hanged as a common traitor, but the Austrian commander in chief changed the sentence to death by shooting. His execution took place in the fortress of Rovereto.

BETTING ON WILSON GROWING STRONGER

Stock Exchanger Firm Has \$100,000 to Place on Wilson At Seven to Ten.

New York, October 14.—A great increase in the volume of money offered that President Wilson will be re-elected caused a decided slump in the favoritism of Hughes in Wall Street today. Small bets were made in the financial district at ten to seven. Hughes backers in some instances offered only even money. A few days ago Hughes was a two-to-one favorite. One of the leading betting commissioners on the curb concluded a wager of \$700.00 to \$1,000 on Wilson. A prominent stock exchange firm is reported to have \$100,000 to place on Wilson at odds of seven to ten.

THE CO. DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATES SPEAK CUMBERLAND MILLS

All Speakers Ring True for Democracy.—Number Present a Record Breaker.

LIFT GIVEN CUMBERLAND

Democratic Administration, Stated Mr. Breece, Has Placed This County Upon a Plane With the First Ten in State.

More than fifty enthusiastic voters heard the Democratic speakers at Cumberland Mills last evening and gave signs of true conviction as to the faith they have in and for Democracy. The speaking opened with a strong speech by Hon. John A. Oates, candidate for State Senate, who was greatly appreciated as was evidenced by the continuance of rounds of applause. Mr. Oates is doing splendid work for the party. He has the manner most pleasing to his hearers and has an individual way of telling the truth concerning the record of Democracy in county, State, and nation which will go a long way toward counteracting the misleading statements often made by unscrupulous Republicans and soreheaded Democrats. Mr. A. B. Breece, candidate for the legislature, followed with a few remarks announcing himself and adding that as long as the Republicans told the whole truth he did not mind it but when they neglect to tell the whole truth and give only half or less of the record, holding a blotter over the other half, when they read the debits, willfully and feloniously concealing the credits entered in the Democratic ledger, that it is too much for him and that such omission amounts to and is the equal of direct falsehoods. He closed by stating that "if the Republican candidates did not have something up their sleeve for you, they would not be trying to get even with you for past and frequent failures sustained and suffered at your hands, and you would never hear a word from them except in eternal praise of our officers and your party that has lifted Cumberland from the sand and the mire and placed it upon a plane with the first ten counties in the state. Mr. W. M. Walker rang true for Democracy from beginning to the end. Reviewing briefly the achievement of the county in the last 16 years. He dug a real Republican grave and told the boys to bury them in November and they said, "yes," all with one accord.

Mr. R. P. Bolton announced his candidacy in his courteous manner and received a generous response to his remarks by frequent applause. Just plain "Heck" candidate for Sheriff made a real speech contrary to precedent. He invariably states that he cannot make a speech, but it is about to become a settled fact that he is a real live wire when it comes down to a heart to heart talk with the folks and he always pleases his hearers. Mr. Henry Williams, candidate for Solicitor of the Records Court, made a short speech in which he received frequent applause, telling several appropriate jokes and real truths concerning the record of Democracy. "Little Dave" Gaster put to rest forever all idea of "Infernal Extravagance" using the language of his Republican opponent when he distributed to all present an official statement of the county's condition now and 16 years ago when it was rescued from the party of "Rule or Ruin," stating that it is the record which gives the Democrats confidence. That "he did not have to juggle or tell any lies about them that the truth was so good that he hardly believed it himself when he read them." No greater interest has been manifested anywhere and the Democrats are feeling "fine" over the prospects claiming that they have nothing to fear from any source. The candidates will speak at Falcon Monday, a. m., and at Cotton Monday night.

GERMANY WILLING TO PAY INDEMNITY

For Dutch Freighter Which Was Destroyed Off the American Coast Sunday.

HALF MILLION DOLLARS

The Estimated Value of Destroyed Vessel and Its Cargo of Grain.—No Official Information Has Been Received.

Amsterdam, October 14.—Germany is willing to make reparation for the destruction of the Dutch freighter Bloomsbijk off the American coast Sunday. Berlin dispatches tonight said that the Dutch ship was sunk contrary to orders and that the Imperial government had expressed a willingness to pay indemnity. The vessel and its cargo of grain was valued at one and a half million dollars. Washington, October 14.—News was received here tonight that Germany has announced her willingness to pay indemnity in the case of the Dutch freighter Bloomsbijk destroyed off the American coast on last Sunday. This is taken as a good augury in shipping circles here. The State Department has received no official information regarding Germany's action.

City of Charleston Profits By Coal Port

Charleston, S. C., October 14.—Construction of the Southern Railway's modern export coal tangle having made Charleston available as a coal port, the first year of its operation has closed with a record which promises great expansion and prosperity for the city. During the year when there was an abnormal scarcity of ships, 98 steamships have taken coal from the Southern's Charleston pier for movement overseas, 7 taking cargo, 14 cargo and bunker, and 77 bunker only. Of the cargoes, 34 moved to Cuba, 6 to South America, and 1 to Spain. The export movement amounted to 63,133 tons while 40,086 tons were bunkered. There was a coastwise movement of 46,256 tons, making a total of 149,474 tons of coal dumped over the pier. In addition 2,000 tons of iron ore and 2,114 tons of coke were exported.

Farmers Win Milk Strike in New York

(By International News Service.) New York, October 14.—The milk strike which has been in progress for seven days came to an end today. The farmers and dairymen were the winners. The big distributing companies agreed to give the farmers an increase of forty-five per cent over the former price paid. The farmers and dairymen lost a total of \$300,000.00 during the strike.

Harvard 21; University of North Carolina 0

Cambridge, Mass., October 14.—Harvard had an easy time defeating the University of North Carolina, 21 to 0 today. In spite of a patched up line and back field in which a half a dozen substitutes were used Harvard was able to stop effectively the offensive of the North Carolina team.

Carranza Issues a Death Penalty Decree

Washington, October 14.—The State Department had been advised of a decree promulgated by General Carranza which provides for the death penalty for "thieves, robbers and persons interfering with railroad and telegraph lines of Mexico." It was declared at the State Department and Department of Justice that no information had been received to confirm reports of defections from Carranza by his military officers.

NEW ITALIAN DRIVE TOWARD TRIESTE IS MAKING PROGRESS

Italians Now Attacking Second Line Positions of Austro-Hungarians.

A GERMAN COUNTER MOVE

On the Somme Front Gave Them Partial Possession of Ablaincourt, But Were Afterward Driven Out By French.

Paris, October 14.—The new Italian drive toward Trieste which is expected to make its influence felt by weakening the Austro-German pressure against Roumania, continues to make progress. Advancing over a front of eight miles the Italians southeast of Gorizia are now attacking the second line positions of the Austro-Hungarians. A strong counter offensive has been undertaken by the Germans on the Somme front. Powerful assaults gave the Germans partial possession of Ablaincourt but they were afterwards driven out by the French. The war office mentioned the violence of the German bombardment. Much uncertainty existed tonight as to the actual situation in the Roumanian theatre of war. Roumanian reports say that the German advance has been checked at some points. No important developments on the Macedonian front were reported. The British war office issued a statement of Balkan operations but it merely announced that nothing of importance had taken place there.
