THE IMPRESSMENT BILL.

Sec. 1. Whenever the exigencies of any war in the field are such as to make impressment of forage, articles of subsistence, or other property absolutely necessary, then such impressment may be made by the officers whose duty it is to furnish such forage, articles of subsistence, or other property for such army. In cases where the owner of such property and the impressment officer cannot agree upon the value thereof, it shall be the duty of such impressment officer, upon affidavit in writing of the owner of such property or his agent, that such property was grown, raised or produced by said owner, or is held or has been purchased by him not for sale or speculation, but for his own use or consumption, to cause the same to be ascertained and determined by the judgment of two loyal and disinterested citizens of the city, county or parish in which such impressment may be made, one to be selected, after taking an oath to appraise the property impressed, fairly and impartially (which oath as the affidavit provided for in this section, the impressment officer is hereby authorized to administer and certify) shall proceed to assess just compensation for the property impressed, whether the absolute ownership or the temporary use thereof is acquired.
Sec. 2. That the duty of impressing property, as aforesaid, shall be performed by the owner, his agent or attorney, compensation fixed by said appraisers, and shall also give to the owner or person controlling said property, a certificate over his official signature, specifying the battalion, regiment, brigade, division or corps to which he belongs; that said property is essential for the use of the army, could not be otherwise procured, and was taken through absolute necessity; setting forth the time and place when and where taken the amount of compensation fixed by said appraisers, and the sum, if any, paid for the same. Said certificate shall be evidence for the owner as well as of the taking of said property for the public use, as the right of the amount of compensation fixed as aforesaid. And in case said officer or person, taking said property shall have failed to pay the owner or his agent, said compensation as herein before required, then said owner shall be en-

NORTHERN AND EUROPEAN NEWS.

DALTON, April 16.—Northern dates to the 13th have been received.
The East Tennessee Convention met at Knoxville on the 12th, with delegates from nearly every county. Tom Nelson made an explanation of his compromise with Jeff. Davis—denounced the acts of the President as unconstitutional, and regarded them as a violation of the Constitution. Wm. Hiskel was elected President. Dan'l Erenhett made a speech, denouncing apostates in the bitterest terms, and said a combination of politicians against the administration existed in strong force. Andy Johnson made a speech, declaring a gross had been working the rich lands of Tennessee long enough; that slavery was already dead, and that if there was no slavery there would be few traitors.
Washington papers of the 12th state that railroad bridges over the Potomac have been destroyed by the freshet, but have been replaced.
New Orleans advices say a large side-wheel steamer evaded the blockaders at Galveston getting in 4,000 stand of arms.
New York advices of the 12th say it is reported that Bishop McCleskey has been appointed Archbishop of New York, and Bishop Spaulding, of Baltimore.
The steamer Virginia, of Liverpool, with dates to the 29th ult., arrived.
The Danish Conference met on the 12th of April.
Cotton dull and unchanged.
The steamer City of New York was wrecked at the entrance of Queenstown harbor by running on a rock, and will prove a total loss.
The Prussians attempted to carry Duppel by storm, but after an engagement of five hours their whole line was repulsed.

Harris, of Maryland, and Fernando Wood, defended Long, of Ohio.
CAIRO, 27th.—Reported that the rebel General Forrest, with a large force was advancing on Paducah last night. Four divisions of reinforcements have been sent from Mayfield.

ADDITIONAL NORTHERN ITEMS.

RICHMOND April 16.—Great excitement at Jonesboro, Illinois, caused by soldiers shooting citizens. A force has been sent to prevent further bloodshed.
The Pennsylvania Senate has adopted a resolution, removing the seat of Government to Philadelphia. Meade will be retained in command of the army of the Potomac.

FROM NORTHERN VIRGINIA.

CULPEPPER C. H., April 17.—Citizens just out of the enemy's lines, say the enemy will force a fight soon, in order to have their own troops, whose term will expire in May, not one fifth of which are re-enlisted. The Yankee army is in anything but fine spirits.
Meade is reported receiving reinforcements rapidly. Maj. W. T. Smith of the army of the West is assigned to duty in this army, as Chief Engineer on Gen. Lee's staff. All quiet in front.

ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS BOUNTY.

FORREST AT WORK AGAIN.

SLAUGHTER OF YANKEES.

Entered according to Act of Congress in the year 1863, by J. S. Thrasher, in the Clerk's office of the District Court of the Confederate States, for the Northern District of Georgia.

Garrison consisted 300 whites and 400 negroes. Fort Republic refused to surrender was carried by storm. Forrest lead Bell's Brigade and Chalmers lead McCullough's, both entered the Fort on opposite sides simultaneously. Indiscriminate slaughter followed. 100 prisoners were taken and the balance slain. The Fort ran with blood. Many jumped in the river and were drowned or shot in the water. Over \$100,000 worth of stores were taken and 6 mules captured. Confederate loss 71.

EXCITEMENT ON THE BLACKWATER.

BURNSIDE LANDING FORCES AT PORTSMOUTH.

RICHMOND April, 16.—The Petersburg papers of this morning report considerable excitement in the Blackwater section, in consequence of an advance of the Yankees. Several skirmishes have taken place. Information deemed reliable to the Petersburg Express, represents Burnside's forces landing large numbers at Portsmouth, on Wednesday.

FROM DALTON.

DALTON, April 15.—All quiet in front. Five Alabamians who were to have been shot to day for desertion, were temporarily reprieved by Gen. Johnson, until the President could be heard from. Weather cloudy and cool.
