THE IMPRESSMENT BILL. Sec. 1. Whenever the exigencies of any army in the field are such as to make impressments of forage, articles of subsistence or other property absolutely necessary, then such impressment may be made by the officers whose duty it is to furnish supplies for such army.

Sec. 2. That the officer or person impressing property, as aforesaid, shall, at the time of said taking, pay to the owner, his agent or attorney, compensation fixed by said appraisers; and shall also give to the owner or person controlling said property, a certificate over his official signature, specifying the battalion, regiment, brigade, division or corps to which he belongs; that said property is essential for the use of the army, could not be otherwise procured, and was taken through absolute necessity; setting forth the time and place when and where taken the amount of compensation fixed by said appraisers, and the sum, if any, paid for the same. Said certificate shall be evidence for the owner as well as of the taking of said property for the public use, as the right of the amount of compensation fixed as aforesaid. And in case said officer or person, taking said property shall have failed to pay the owner or his agent, said compensation as hereinafter provided, then said owner shall be entitled to the same.

Sec. 3. That whenever the Secretary of War shall be of opinion that it is necessary to take private property for public use, by reason of the impracticability of procuring the same by purchase, so as to accumulate necessary supplies for the army, or the good of the service in any locality, he may, by general order thro the proper subordinate officer, authorize said property to be taken for the public use, the compensation due the owner for the same to be determined and the value found as provided for in the first and second sections of this act.

Sec. 4. That whenever the Secretary of War shall be of opinion that it is necessary to take private property for public use, by reason of the impracticability of procuring the same by purchase, so as to accumulate necessary supplies for the army, or the good of the service in any locality, he may, by general order thro the proper subordinate officer, authorize said property to be taken for the public use, the compensation due the owner for the same to be determined and the value found as provided for in the first and second sections of this act.

Sec. 5. That, it shall be the duty of the President, as early as practicable after the passage of this act, to appoint a commissioner in each State whose property shall be taken for the public use, at the request of the Governor or of such of the States in which the President shall appoint said commissioners to appoint another commissioner to act in conjunction with the commissioner appointed by the President, who shall receive the compensation of eight dollars per day, and ten cents per mile as mileage, to be paid by the Confederate Government. Said commissioners shall constitute a board whose duty it shall be to fix upon the prices to be paid by the Government, for all property impressed or taken for the public use, as aforesaid, so as to afford just compensation to the owners thereof. Said commissioners shall agree upon, and publish a schedule of prices, every two months or oftener, if they shall deem it proper, and in the event they shall not be able to agree in any matter confined to them in this act, they shall have to appoint an umpire to decide the matter in dispute whose decision shall be the decision of the board; and said umpire shall receive the same rate of compensation for the time he shall serve, allowed to said commissioners, respectively. Provided, That said commissioners shall be residents of the State for which they shall be appointed; and if the Governor of any State shall neglect to appoint said commissioner, within ten days after a request to do so by the President, the President shall appoint both commissioners by and with the advice and consent of the Senate.

Sec. 6. That all property impressed or taken for the public use, as aforesaid, in the hands of any person other than the persons who have raised, grown, or produced the same, or persons holding the same for their own use or consumption, and who shall make the affidavit hereinafter required, shall be paid for according to the schedule of prices fixed by the commissioner as aforesaid. But if the officer and the owner shall differ as to the quality of the article or property impressed or taken, thereby making it fall within a higher or lower price named in the schedule, then the owner or agent and the officer may select each a loyal and disinterested citizen of the qualifications, as aforesaid, to determine the quality of such article or property, who shall, in case of disagreement, appoint an umpire of like qualifications, and his decision, if approved by the officers impressing, shall be final. But if not approved, the impressing officer shall send the award to the commissioner of the State, where the property is impressed, with the reasons for disapproving the same, and said commissioners may hear such proof, and their decision shall be final, provided, that the owner may receive the price offered by the impressing officer, without prejudice to his claim to receive the higher compensation.

Sec. 7. Provides that all property necessary for the support of the owner and his family, or for the carrying on of his business or occupation, shall not be impressed.

Sec. 8. Provides that property lost or damaged while temporarily impressed by the officer, shall be paid for, by them or an equivalent in damages.

Sec. 9. Provides that the impressment of slaves shall be regulated by the laws of the State where the impressment is made, and in absence of such State laws, then to be regulated by the Secretary of War.

Sec. 10. That prior to the first day of December next, no slave laboring on a farm or plantation exclusively devoted to the production of grain and provisions, shall be taken for the public use, without the consent of the owner, except in case of urgent necessity.

Sec. 11. That any commissioned officer or private who shall violate the provisions of the act, shall be tried before the military court of the corps to which he is attached, on complaint made by the owner or other person, and on conviction, if an officer, he shall be cashiered and put into tanks as a private, and if a non-commissioned officer or private he shall suffer such punishment not inconsistent with military law, as the court may direct.

From 1st to last day of July, inc., at 66 2/3. From 1st to last day of Aug., inc., at 66 2/3. From 1st to last day of Sept., inc., at 66 2/3. Swept away by monthly tax, Oct. inc., at 66 2/3. Any non-interest bearing \$100 notes held on the first of January, 1865, are taxed 100 per cent., thus destroying every vestige of value.

FROM NORTHERN GEORGIA. Fighting at Resaca! Every Effort of the Enemy Repulsed!

FROM THE TRANS-MISSISSIPPI. UNCONDITIONAL SURRENDER OF BANKS AND HIS ARMY!!

ATLANTA, May 16.—Since the repulse of the enemy at Dalton, he has been moving around our left, closely followed by Johnston, who has held him in check in every effort against our lines. Communication and the nature of the country prevents the massing of a large number of troops.

On Friday the attempt against Resaca was resumed, and continued through Saturday and Sunday.

Every attack was successfully repulsed, with small loss on our side.

No press reports or private telegrams received from the field.

It is believed that both armies are now deploying into the Valley of Oostanaula.

We refrain from giving conjectures, and information from the field is too incomplete to exhibit the result. The relief committee on arriving here, were notified that they are not needed at the front.

The following telegram was received by J. W. Sandford, on yesterday, from his son at Mobile, Ala.

MOBILE, May 16th.—Banks's unconditional surrender announced here this morning.

Under the caption of "Specimens of Gubernatorial Literature," the Standard quotes the following as having been uttered by Gov. VANCE, while in Virginia:

"Boys, if you want peace you must go to the heart of Pennsylvania, and there fight till hell freezes over as hard as a light wood knot."

"Boys, when you whip Grant I will send each of you a bottle of whiskey, with enough sugar to sweeten it."

"Boys, you must fight till you fill hell so full of Yankees that their feet will stick out of the windows."

We understand from gentlemen who heard every speech the Governor made to the soldiers in Virginia, that he used no such language as ascribed to him by the Standard—and that the above is a total perversion of what the Governor did say.

The Petersburg Express says that Kirby Smith is to "restore New Orleans and the great Mississippi Valley." The remark does not appear to us as boasting, and when we consider the splendid army under Gen. Smith and the broken, demoralized herd under Gen. Banks, it is suggestive of other victories in that department for the Confederate cause. At this distance, it seems to us that he might easily march to, and lay siege to New Orleans, or, if not that, seize a point on the Mississippi, and once more stop Yankee gunboats. That stream is of little use as it is now, but still we would like to see a Confederate garrison on it.

ENROLLING NOTICE. Enrolling Office, Fayetteville, May 4, 1864.

CONCURRENTLY with recent appointments of Chief En. Off. 4th Com. Dist. in obedience to instructions from him, it is hereby ordered that:

I. All white male residents of Cumberland county, between the ages of 17 and 45 and 50, belonging to the 53d Reg't N. C. Militia, shall appear at Fayetteville on the 19th inst., and those belonging to 54th Reg't on the 20th inst., excepting those from 71st and Quail Hills Districts, who shall appear on the 21st inst. A. M. that they may then be examined by Medical Ex'g. Board, and submit such claims as they have to Exemption or Detail. Any person who may have failed to enroll himself will be placed in service in the field unless he shall present on these appointed days a reasonable excuse therefor, to be judged of by the President.

II. All free persons of color between the ages of 18 and 50, will be enrolled by Officers of Home Guard and brought before Medical Ex'g. Board and Local Enrolling Office, for examination and proper disposition, on the 21st inst. A. M. Manufacturers and Companies of any kind, having as employees "free negroes" whom they desire to retain, must file in this office proper applications for them prior to day of Enrollment.

III. All between 18 and 45, a re-examination of whom was ordered especially, as well as those who by sickness or other good reason failed to appear at last Enrollment must now present themselves on the 20th inst., for final examination.

It may also be added, that some have been found to have entirely neglected or refused to comply with what is a very reasonable requirement on them—report themselves, record their cause for being out of the army, and receive a certificate to that effect. No man can be presumed to exempt, but the contrary, until his claim to exemption becomes apparent. Hereafter no further notice will be given, but all between the ages of conscription not accounted for in this office by the 21st inst., will be arrested wherever found, and none can feel himself injured.
