THE SACRAMENTO AT CHERBOURG.—DEPARTURE OF THE NIAGARA.—A correspondent of the London Daily News says: "It has, I believe, been already mentioned, that as soon as the United States corvette Sacramento arrived in the port of Cherbourog, the Niagara, Federal frigate, which was there at the same time, put out to sea after a long conference between the two captains. It is now stated that the object of the Niagara's precipitate departure was to look out for a Confederate steamer—the General Lee, which has recently been seen off the Bermudas, and will, it is thought, be found somewhere on the coast of Europe towards the latter end of this month. The Lee is said to be a very fine vessel, well manned and commanded."

GEN FORREST.—The Augusta Chronicle says that parties from Atlanta state that a Gen. Forrest was wounded in a recent fight in the foot. They also state that he was from Mississippi. We hope that the able commander has at last been permitted by the Richmond authorities to unite his forces with the Army of Tennessee—although we regret to hear that he is wounded. If he had been permitted to come in Sherman's rear long ago—as he desired, and as Gen. Johnston urged, many of our existing evils would have been prevented.

FROM ATLANTA.—It was rumored in our streets last night that Hood had driven on Sherman back several miles. We were unable to ascertain the foundation of the report. A passenger by the Central Railroad states he was informed by a gentleman from Macon that news had been received in that city that Sherman was defeated badly.

FROM THE AUGUSTA CHRONICLE & SENTINEL. A Letter from GEORGE A. ELSWORTH, MORGAN'S TELEGRAPH OPERATOR.—A letter has lately been put in circulation by some of the newspapers, that George A. Elsworth Morgan's telegraph operator, had deserted to the Yankees. This annexed letter received by a friend of his in this city, explains why he is not now in the Confederacy, and at once refutes the slanderous report concerning him: Petersburg, Va., May 3, 1864. My dear friend, I was wounded and captured by the Yankees. They were conveying me to Lexington, via Mt. Sterling. While at the latter place I made my escape. I was wounded quite severely in the right side just above the hip. This was on the 15th of April, and on the 21st I escaped. I gave to my assumed name. They did not know who they had or they would have guarded me more closely. I arrived in Canada on the 25th of April and am fast recovering from my wound. I hope to start for Dixie sometime in June. I intend to come via Bermuda. Please let my friends know of my situation. I am yours, very respectfully, Geo. A. Elsworth, Morgan's Operator.
