CLAIMS

OF Deceased Officers and Soldiers.
Witness, June 20th, 1864.
J. H. UNDERSON has been appointed a Commissioner to investigate, collect and pay over to the parties entitled thereon, all claims for bounty, arrears of pay and allowances, due to the representatives of deceased officers and soldiers from this State.
The parties entitled are, first, the widow of the deceased, if any, if she be residing there; secondly, the child or children, if the deceased, if there be neither wife nor children then; thirdly, the father, if he be neither widow, child, children or father, fourthly, the mother of the deceased, and in default of all of these then, fitly, the next of kin or administrator of the deceased.
The claimant or claimants must furnish his, her or their affidavit, that of one disinterested witness as to the identity, and in all cases the affidavit must negative the existence of a claimant or claimants of a higher order. The Justice of the Peace, before whom the affidavit is subscribed must certify to the credibility of the witness, and Clerk of the County Court must certify, under the seal of the Court, that he is a Justice of the Peace.
If the claimant or claimants be a child or children of the deceased, and he, she or they be minors, the claim must be propounded by his, her or their guardian, and the fact of his being guardian must be certified to, under seal of the County Court Clerk.
When the claim is made by an executor or administrator, the fact of the executorship or administratorship must be certified to, under seal by the County Court Clerk.
All of these papers should be sent to duplicate, upon application to me, with a proper form of these papers in full, a copy of which, for the greater convenience of parties, will be forwarded as soon as may be practicable to each County Court Clerk.
Parties interested may materially aid me in the investigation of their claims, if at the time of forwarding their paper to me, they will inform me of the date of the death of the deceased, where he died, whether or not he or she or any one for them, have received the personal effects which deceased had with him at the time of his death, and whether or not the deceased (if a non-commissioned officer or private), had ever received the State's bounty.
It is very desirable that all claims should be forwarded at as early a day as may be practicable. In all cases, give the claimant's Post Office and County in full.

Comparatively quiet reigned in the city last night.
The enemy continue to concentrate a force on our left; Palmer's corps occupying the extreme right, has headquarters on the Sandtown road, and Smith's on the left.
About 75 prisoners including a captain and lieutenant was brought in yesterday and late last night.
Gen. Wheeler has issued congratulatory orders to the cavalry on the defeat and route of the enemy's raiding party.
All quiet save some sharp-shooting.

RICHMOND, Feb. 20th, 1864.
The friends and relatives of soldiers in the Army of Northern Virginia are hereby notified that an arrangement has this day been effected with the SOUTHERN EXPRESS COMPANY, to carry all packages of food and wearing apparel to Richmond, Va.
To secure the advantages thus obtained through the express company, the following instructions must be observed:
Packages must not contain more than one hundred pounds; be well secured, and plainly marked, and sent at the expense of the shipper to either of the Soldiers' Relief Associations, which are located as follows:
In North Carolina, at Raleigh; in South Carolina, at Columbia; in Georgia, at Augusta; in Alabama, at Montgomery; or at any other point at which one of these Associations have an office.
The Agents of these Associations will there take charge of them, and ship daily, by Southern Express Company, to the proper Agents of the respective States at Richmond, who will see them distributed to the proper individual owners.
To meet the wishes of the soldiers, and to give them a certain and speedy communication with home the Southern Express Company has agreed to give this freight preference over everything else; and in order that no obstacle may occur to the success of so laudable an enterprise, the several Railroad Companies are hereby requested to render the Express Company such facilities as will enable it to make this arrangement a complete success.
As the Southern Express Company assumes all responsibility of the transportation of these packages, the Relief Associations are requested to withdraw their Agents who heretofore acted as traveling messengers. If the Relief Association will establish agencies in the rear of these armies, they may enjoy the same privileges hereby secured to the Army of Northern Virginia.

Reported that Hooker will supersede Meade.
Reported defeat of the Confederates under Bradley in Mississippi.

MONDAY, Aug. 4.—Yesterday and last night the enemy threw their infantry on Dauphin Island, seven miles from Fort Gaines. The fleet outside is large. This morning a Federal double ended opened on the transport Dick Keys and then on the fort, which is replying slowly.
Gen. Maury calls on all to enroll themselves for battle, and great confidence prevails. A Federal force estimated at 1,600 occupy Holly Springs, Miss.

ATLANTA, Aug. 5.—

The enemy have been unusually active during the last 15 hours. About four o'clock on yesterday afternoon, there was a heavy assault upon the works held by our skirmishers upon the extreme left. After some stubborn fighting, they succeeded in gaining possession of them, but were subsequently driven from them. Our lines were re-established about 10 o'clock last night. The assault upon our skirmish lines extended from the centre to the extreme left. The movement having been anticipated it resulted in a complete failure. Brisk skirmishing continued throughout the night up to the present time. Both affairs insignificant. Comparative quiet in the city through day and night and but few shells thrown; resulting as usual in no damage.
RICHMOND, Aug. 5.—Baltimore papers say that on yesterday Hooker was ordered to report to Washington for the purpose, it is supposed, of succeeding to the command now held by Meade.
Early's forces still occupy positions west of Harper's Ferry.
In an engagement near Cumberland Mountain between the Federal forces under Kelly and a body of Confederates under Bradley Johnston, the Confederates are said to be defeated with a loss of the wagons and spoils brought from Pennsylvania.

RICHMOND, Aug. 5.—

The Confederates are again crossing into Maryland at Dam No. four.
The Louisiana Convention adopted a new constitution on the 3d and will be immediately submitted to the people.
Gold unchanged.
Advices from Europe to the 20th, says that all the islands west of the coast of Schleswig are now in possession of the Germans. Peace negotiations will probably be commenced in Vienna on the 19th ult.

RICHMOND, Aug. 6.—

A special to the Whig from Petersburg says it having been ascertained that the enemy was moving extensively in front of Gracie's brigade on our centre it was determined to stop their operations by countermoving. Our culvert being completed was exploded between 6 and 7 o'clock last night, blowing up the enemy's skirmish line and demolishing his mines. The affair was a great success, completely frustrating the object of the enemy at that point by throwing the troops along his lines in great confusion. No infantry attack was intended being made outside of artillery. The firing along the whole line was very rapid for the space of an hour.
