Before 1st April, 1864, at par.

From 1st to last day of April, inc., at 66 2/3

From 1st to last day of May, inc., at 56 2/3

From 1st to last day of June, inc., at 46 2/3

From 1st to last day of July, inc., at 36 2/3

From 1st to last day of Aug., inc., at 26 2/3

From 1st to last day of Sept., inc., at 16 2/3

From 1st to last day of Oct., inc., at 6 2/3

Any non-interest bearing \$100 notes held on the first of January, 1865, are taxed 100 per cent., thus destroying every vestige of value.
