From 1st to last day of June, inc., at 46 2/3. From 1st to last day of July, inc., at 36 2/3. From 1st to last day of Aug., inc., at 26 2/3. From 1st to last day of Sept., inc., at 16 2/3. Swept away by monthly tax, Oct. inc., at 6 2/3. Any non-interest bearing \$100 notes held on the first of January, 1865, are taxed 100 per cent., thus destroying every vestige of value.

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## CLAIMS Of Deceased Officers and Soldiers.

Wilson's C. June 30th, 1864. THE UNDERSIGNED has been appointed a Commissioner to investigate, collect and pay over to the parties entitled thereto, all claims for bounty, arrears of pay and allowances, due to the representatives of deceased officers and soldiers from this State.

The parties entitled are: first, the widow of the deceased, if any of them be not widow then, secondly, the child or children, if there be such, if there be neither widow or children then, thirdly, the father, if there be neither widow, child, children or father then, fourthly, the mother of the deceased, and in default of all of these, the estate, executor or administrator of the deceased.

FROM LEE'S ARMY. FIGHTING ON THE WELDON ROAD. THE ENEMY STILL HOLD IT! GRANT STRONGLY FORTIFYING!!

NORTHERN NEWS. SHERIDAN RETREATING FROM THE VALLEY, WITH A LOSS OF 500 MEN AND 72 WAGONS!

Richmond, Aug. 22.—Official dispatches state that General Hill attacked the enemy near the Weldon Railroad, Sunday morning, and drove them from his advance lines of entrenchments, capturing over 300 prisoners.

Richmond, Aug. 22.—The Baltimore Gazette of the 20th has been received, which says Grant captured 500 prisoners on the north side of the James river. The object of the expedition was to prevent our forces from drowning the men while cutting a canal across Dutch Gap.

Petersburg, Aug. 22.—All quiet along the lines to-day, but little shelling and less picket firing. The enemy still hold possession of the Weldon Railroad, and scouts report are continuing to fortify.

Petersburg, Aug. 22.—About 9 o'clock to-day our forces again attacked the enemy's works on the Weldon Railroad, in front and flank. The column assaulting in front pushed the enemy half way, capturing two lines of earthworks and 300 prisoners.

Petersburg, Aug. 22.—Since the fight on Sunday, the enemy have been engaged in extending his line west of the rail road and towards the city. The enemy now occupy the ground on which the battles for the last few days were fought, and his pickets have advanced some distance this side.

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troughly fortified. The country south of the city is very level and the enemy's line is in sight of the corporate limits. Both armies are strongly entrenched. There have been no offensive movements on the other side to-day and everything consequently very quiet.
