WILSON, N. C. June 20th, 1804. HE UNDERSIGNED has been appointed a Commissioner to breestigate, collect and pay even to the parties entitled thereto, all claims fer bount 'arrentages of pay and allow

ances, due to the representatives of pay and allow ances, due to the representatives of decrased of-ficers and soldiers from this little. The parties entitled are : first, the widow of the decrased, if any, if there as no widow then, secondly, the child or children, if there be such. if there be neither widow or children then, thirdly, the father, if there be neither widow, child, children or father then, fourthly, the mother of the deceased, and in default of all of these then, lifthly, the executor or administrator of the deceased.

The claimant or claimants must furnish his, her or their adidavit, and t

where the el imant is not the widow, the allidavit must negative the existence of a claimant or claimants of a higher order. - The Justice of the Peace, before whom the affidavit is subscribed must certify to the credibility of the witness, and Clerk of the County Court must for the seal of the Court, that he is

the claimant or claimants be'a child or children of the deceased, and he, she or they be minors, the claim must be propounded by his, her or their guardian, and the fact of his

being guardian must be certified to, under seal of the County Court Clerk. When the clair is made by an executor or administrator, the fact of the executorship oradministratorship must be certified to, under seal by the County Court Clerk.

All of these papers should be sent in Paplicate.

As y person directly interested will be firmish ed, tipon application to me, with a proper form of these papers in full; a copy of which, for the greater convenience of parties, will be forwarded as soon as may be practicable to each County Court Clerk.

This commission is intended to facilitate the collection of these claims, and save the claimants all expense.

Parties interested may materially aid me in the investigation of their claims, if at the time of forwarding their paper to me, they will inform me of the date of the death of the deceased, where he died, was killed. whether or not they or any one for them, have received the nal effects which deceased had with him at the time of his death, and whether or not the deceased (if a non-commissioned officer or private,) had ever received the State's bounty. It is very desirable that all claims should be forwarded at as early a day as may be practicable. In all cases, give the claimants' Post Office and County in full. JNO. A .STANLY,

RICHMOND, Feb. 20th, 1864.

THE friends and relativet of soldiers in the Army of Northern Virginia are bereby notified that an arrangement has this day ocen effected with the SOUTHERN EXPRESS COMPANY, to carry all packages of food and wearing apparel to Richmond. Va.

To secure the advantages thus obtained through the express company, the following instructions must be observed :

Paakages must not confam more than one hundred pounds; be well secured, and daialy marked, and sent at the expense of the supper to either of the Soldiers' tielief Associations, which are located as follows:

In North Carolina, at Raleich; in South Carolina, at Columbia; in Georgia, at Augusta; in Alabama, at Montgomery; or at any other point at which one of these Asociations have an office.

The Agents of these Associations will there take charge of them. and ship daily, by Southern Express Company, to the proper Agenis of the respective States at kichmond, who will see them distributed to the proper individual owners.

To meet the wishes of the soldiers, and to give them a certain and speedy communication with home the Southern Express Company has agreed to give this freig t prefer ence over everything else : and Hi, order that no obstacle may occur to, the success of so landable an enterprise, the several Eailroad Companies are bereby requested to rei der the Express Company such facilitics as will enable it to make this arrange. ment a complete success.

As the Southern Express Company asand s all responsibility of the transporta-tion of those packages, the Relief Associa-tions are required to withdraw their 3 ce is who have nereto ore acted as travelng messengers. If the Relief Association will establish agencies in the rear of there armies, they may enjoy the same privileges rereby secured to the Army of Northern Virginia.

BY THE GOV. OF NORTH GAROLINA

A PROCEAMATION! THEREAS, IT IS REPORTED TO ME that many soldiers from the troops of this State have deserted their colors and comrades. and are now lurking in the woods and mountains, some of them subsisting by forcing their triends to violate the laws by aiding them and others by violent depredations upon peace able citizens, entailing shame and oblogay upon themselves and their posterily, entroping thelaws and the peace of society, and damaging the cause of their hard pressed country.

And, whereas, Gen. Robert E. Lee, in General Order No. 54, Aug. 16th, 1864, has promised to deal leniently with all who promitly return to duty, though they may have incurred the penalties of descrition by prolonged absonce without authority. Now, therefore, I. Zebulon B. Vance, Governor of the State of North Carolina, do issue this my proclamation, urg-ing most earnestly upon all such misguided men to wije out from their once respected names the foul stain of desertion by promptly returning to the post of duty in geoordance with said General Order No. 54, promising to all such who voluntarily return or surrender themsels es to the proper anthorities a full and free pardon, or the infliction of only the mildest penalties of the military law, except those who have been guilty of capital felonies against the 'ives and property of the citizens, and this promise shall hold good for thirty days from the date hereof. And I hereby warn all such who refuse to comply with these terms that the utmost power of this State will be exected to capture them of drive them from the horders of a county whose high honor and spetlers renown they disguace by refusing to detend. and that the extremest penalties of the law will be enforced without exception when caught, as well against their aiders and, abotters in the civil courts. Simplifancoully with this proclamation orders will issue to the entire militia of the State to tarn out for their arrest, and I hope by finely submission they will spare me the pain of hanting down like guilty felons many brave and bisguided men who have served their country well and could do so again. Deserters from other States who hide in car woods and assist in giving our State a lad name, I can do nothing for, but to the erring soldiers of North Carolina I confidently appeal. And I carnegtly call on all good citizens to assist me in making this appeal effectual, both by their influence as men, to take prime to seek out all deserters of their acquaintance, put this proclamation in their hands, or infile hands of their relatives and triends, and trige upon them to return to the path of duty, which is also the path of safety and of honor. If every good and loval cititizen would set about to reclaim or capture one deserter by every means in his power, he would succeedend he will have rendered a most valuable and patriotic service to his State and country. Civil magistrates are also exhorted to be diligent in proceeding against all such as violat, the statute against
