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The claimant or claimants must fu nish his. her or their affidavit, and that of one disinterested witness as to the relationship, and in all cases, where the cl.imant is not the widow, the affidavit must negative the existence of a claimant or claimants of a higher order. The Jus-tice of the Peace, before whom the affidavit is subscribed must certify to the credibility of the witness, and Clerk of the County Court must certify, under the seal of the Court, that he is a Justice of the Peace. If the claimant of claimants be a child or

children of the deceased, and he, she or they be minors, the claim must be propounded by his, her or their guardian, and the fact of his being guardian must be certified to, under seal of the County Court Clerk.

When the claim is made by an executor or administrator, the fact of the executorship or administratorship must be certified to, under seal by the County Court Clerk. All of these papers should be sent in Sapli-

cale.

Any person directly interested will be furnish ed, upon application to me, with a proper form of these papers in full; a copy of which, for the greater convenience of parties, will be forwarded as soon as may be practicable to each County Court Clerk.

This commission is intended to facilitate the collection of these claims, and save the claimants all expense.

FROM LEE'S ARMY. ALL QUIET IN FRONT! GRANT RECEIVING REINFORCE. MENTS !

LYNCHBURG, VA., Sept. 22 .- The Press has a report of the fight in the Valley on Monday, which is represented to have been of great severity, and occurred on the Berryville road, 2 miles below |Winchester| The earliest part of the engagement was decidedly in our favor, but a flank movement of the enemy's cavalry necessitated a retrogade movement on our part, which was perfected in an orderly manner, without hurry or confusion. The position to which our army fell back is Fisher's Hill, this side of Strasburg, said to be a very strong one. Losses on both sides very severe, enormously on the part of the enemy.

Gen. H. Fitz Lee, and York, of Louisians, were wounded, the latter losing an arm, the former not believed dangerously. General Rhodes was killed wailst selecting a position for Butler to fill a gap in our lines. The shot struck behind his car and causing death in a few moments. All the advantage is on our side except the less of ground. The enemy are believed to have numbered 40,000, and it is reported that Grant was in command.

A PROCLAMATION:

TT HEREAS, IT IS REPORTED TO ME that many-soldiers from the troops of this State have deserted their colors and comrades, and are now lurking in the woods and mountains, some of them subsisting by forcing, their friends to violate the laws by aiding them and others by violent depredations upon peace able citizens, entailing shame and obloguty. upon themselves and their posterity, outraging thelaws and the peace of society, and damaging the cause of their hard pressed country.

And, whereas, Gen. Robert E. Lee, in Gen-eral Order No. 54, Aug. 10th, 1864, has prom-ised to deal leniently with all who promptly return to duty, though they may have incurred the penalties of descrition by prolonged abstince without authority. Now, therefore, I, Zcbulon B. Vance, Governor of the State of North Carolina, do issue this my proclamation, urging most earnestly upon all such misguided men to wipe out from their once respected names the foul stain of desertion by promptly returning to the post of duty in accordance with said General Order No. 54, promising to all such who voluntarily return or surrender themsel, es to the proper authorities a full and free pardon, or the infliction of only the mildest penalties of the military law, except those who have been guilty of capital felonics against the lives and property of the citizens, and this promise shall hold good for thirty days from the date hereof. And I hereby warn all such who refuse to comply with these terms that the atmost power of this State will be exerted to capture them or drive them from the borders of a county whose high honor and spotless renown they disgrace by refusing to defend, and that the extremest penalties of the law will be enforced without exception when caught, as well against their aiders and abetters in the civil courts. Simultaneously with this proclamation orders will issue to the entire militia of the State to turn out for their arrest, and 1 hope by timely submission they will spare me the pain of hunting down like guilty felons many brave and misguided men who have served their country well and could do so again, Deseriers from other States who hide in out woods and assist in giving our State a bad name, I can do nothing for, but to the erring soldiers of North Carolina I confidently appeal. And I earnestly call on all good citizens to assist me in making this appeal effectual, both by their influence as men, to take p : ins to seek out all deserters of their acquaintance, put this proclamation in their hands, or in the hands of their relatives and friends, and urge upon them to return to the path of duty, which is also the path of safety and of honor. If every good and oyal cititizen would set about to reclaim or capture one deserter by every means, in his power, he would succeed and he will have rendered a most valuable and patriotic service to his State and country. Civil magistrates are also exhorted to be diligent in proceeding against all such as violate the statute against harboring, aiding or abetting deserters, and warning is hereby given that in all cases where either civil magistrates or militia or home guard officers refuse or neglect to faithfully perform their duty in this respect, upon proper evidence submitted to me, the Executive protection extended to them under acts of Congress shall be withdrawn, as I cannot certify that officers, civil or military, who refuse to perform their duties are "necessary to the due administration of the laws,.' which they will not execute. Given under my hand, and the great seal of the State, at Raleigh, this 24th day of August; 1864

PETERSBURG, Sept. 22 --- Excepting the usual picket firing and mortar shelling. all quiet at the front. Reports of heavy reinforcements to Grant prevail and are generally believed to be true. The enemy is very vigorous on our right, evi-. dently fearing an attack on the Weldon Railroad.

OLD JOHN BROWN .- A correspondent of the Iredell (N. C.) Express writes from Charlestown, Va., as fellows:

The jail, some of the churches and especially the Court House in this town are defaced and torn up in an outrageous manner. The last is the house in which old "Ossawatamie" (Brown) was senteneed to death. The lower story, was used by the enemy for a horse stable, the upper rooms, galleries, &c., well, for priveys .---Not a vestige of furniture, banistering or anything of the sort remains. Yesterday, I visited the spot where Brown was executed ; near it grew a large locust tree, of which nothing is left but a very low stump-every splinter has been carried to all corners of Yanksedom and converted into breast-pins, walking canes. &c., and preserved as relies of the tree on which 'John Brown' the martyr,' was hung ! when in reality, the gallows on which he hanged sure enough now constitutes a por ion of a certain piazza in this town.

THE N. C. SCHEDULE. - Our smart commissioners put the price of \$19 per bushel on Irish potatoes. They were sold en the streets here yesterday at six ! and the Post Commissary at Asheville, the home of one of the Commissioners, refuses to pay even the schedule prices, more offering than he needs at four dollars. We could expect no better from men who put eats 32 lbs. to the bushel at \$8, and corn 56 lbs. to the bushel at \$6, . State Joarnal.

NEW MILITARY PRISON. -The Charlotte Bulletin has received information that Wilian's Mills, ten miles above Columbia, on De Charlotte and South Carolina Railroad, say been selected as the site of a new Conteuerate States Military Prison. It is to be commenced at lonce and hurried on to completion with all possible dispatch. It is to be a stockade, and capable of accommodating thirty thousand prisoners.
