Paakages must not contain more than one hundred pounds; be well secured, and lainly marked, and sent at the expense of the supper to either of the Soldiers' Relief Associations. which are located as follows: In North Carolins, at Raleigh; in South Any non-interest bearing \$100 notes gusta; in Alabama, at Montgomery; or at any other point at which one of these Asociations have an office.

The Agents of these Associations will there take charge of them, and ship daily, by Southern Express Company, to the proper Agents of the respective States at Richy mond, who will see them distributed to the proper iudividual owners.

To meet the wishes of the soldiers, and to give them a certain and speedy communication with home the Southern Express Company has agreed to give this freight prefer ence over everything else : and in order that no obstacle may occur to the success of so laudable an enterprise, the several Railroad Companies are hereby requested to rei der the Express Company such facilities as will enable it to make this arrangement a complete success.

As the Southern Express Gompany assumes all responsibility of the transportation of these packages, the Relief Associa-tions are requested to attack witheir Agents who have neretofore acted as traveling messengers. If the Roliel Association will establish agencies in the rear of there armes, they may enjoy the same privileges hereby secured to the Army of Northern Virginia.

We have, says the Charlottsville Chronicle, censured Gen. Early for remaining at Winchester after the withdrawal of a pertion of his command. We learn that we did him injustice, and that he is not responsible for that mistake-if mistake it was.

We also learn that his conduct of the battle at Winchester, and of the retreat from that point, was marked by ability. The army have lost no confidence in him. The whole series of disasters is attributed to the inferiority in numbers of our cavalry, and the inefficiency of some brigades in Gen. Lomax's division.

Our army did not behave well at Fisher's Hill. Lomax's cavalry, scho were dismounted there, and placed on our left, seon gave away before the enemy, whe thus flanked us, and our infantry hastily retreated.

At Newmarket the army behaved well and repulsed an attack of the eneny.

We learn that Sheridan's whole infantry force did not at this period exceed 15, 000 men. Our losses at Winchester are roughly estimated at 3,000; of whom about one-half were taken prisoners.-We took about 400 prisoners. The loss of Gen. Rhedes produced a prefound impression in the army; but his successor, Gen. Ramseur, is regarded as a fine officer, and commands the confidence of the division.
