PETERSBURG. Oct. 22 .- The enemy is reported moving in heavy force, with infutry, a tillery and cavalry, this morning, on our extreme right, and heavy skirmishing has been going on since sunr se, 7 miles below here, between the Weldon and Southside Railroad.

RICHMOND, Oct 27 .- Heavy skirtnishing commenced at an early hour on the

There is another report in connection with this which throws d scredit on both. It is that two hundred of the rebel troops were shot for refusing to cross. It is said that the French took passession, of Matamoras, Mexico, on the 26th ultimo, without opposition and that General Meila, was appointed to the command of the town .--Everything is repeated quiet there, at the date of the latest accounts. There are said to be twenty thousand bales of cotten at Matamoras.

Lichmond papers to-day state that the Confederate authorities have withdrawn our prisoners of war from labor on their fortilications, in consignence of the retaliatory order of Gen. Butier's, placing their soldiers in our hands at Dutch Gap, under fire. This important concession on the part of the rebels will result in the immediate removal of their soldiers from Dutch Gap, when General Butler shall have been officially notified of the truth of the ani.ouncement.

RICHMOND, Oct. 27.-The New Or'eans Era of the 12th, announces the arrival of a large number of Federal prisoners at the mouth of Bed river. The Federals are strongly fortifying Morganza.

Admiral Porter has gone North to take command of the North Pacific squadron: Farragut is believed to be still in Mobile.

European News!

RICHMOND, Oct. 27 .- European advices to the 14th received. The frigate Niagara had seized a vessel under Spanish colors, supposed to be a blockade runner. Semmes left Liverpool on the 13th, with eight officers and one hundred men, to take command of the Privateer Ranger.

Further from Lee's Army! FIGHTING NEAR PETERSBURG !!! PETERSBURG, Oct 27 - Tae enemy, with a force of cavalry, artillery and three corps of infantry, 2d, 5th and 9th. moved this morning by a detour on our extreme right; driving in our cavalry and occupying the Boydon plantation near Burges' Mills, 9 miles below here.

Our forces were disposed to meet them. Considerable fighting occurred between 4 o'clock and night. The enemy at night still held the Plank Road, and we have captured about 60 prisoners from the 2nd corps. This move places the enemy further from the Southside Road, than they were before. Fighting not yet ended.
